Parliament will adjourn to-day and Wednesday for Hon. Alex. McKenzie's funeral. Sir John Thompson, Hon. Mr. Bowell and Mr. Patterson will attend as representatives of the ministry. A state funeral was not held—at the express wish of deceased's family.

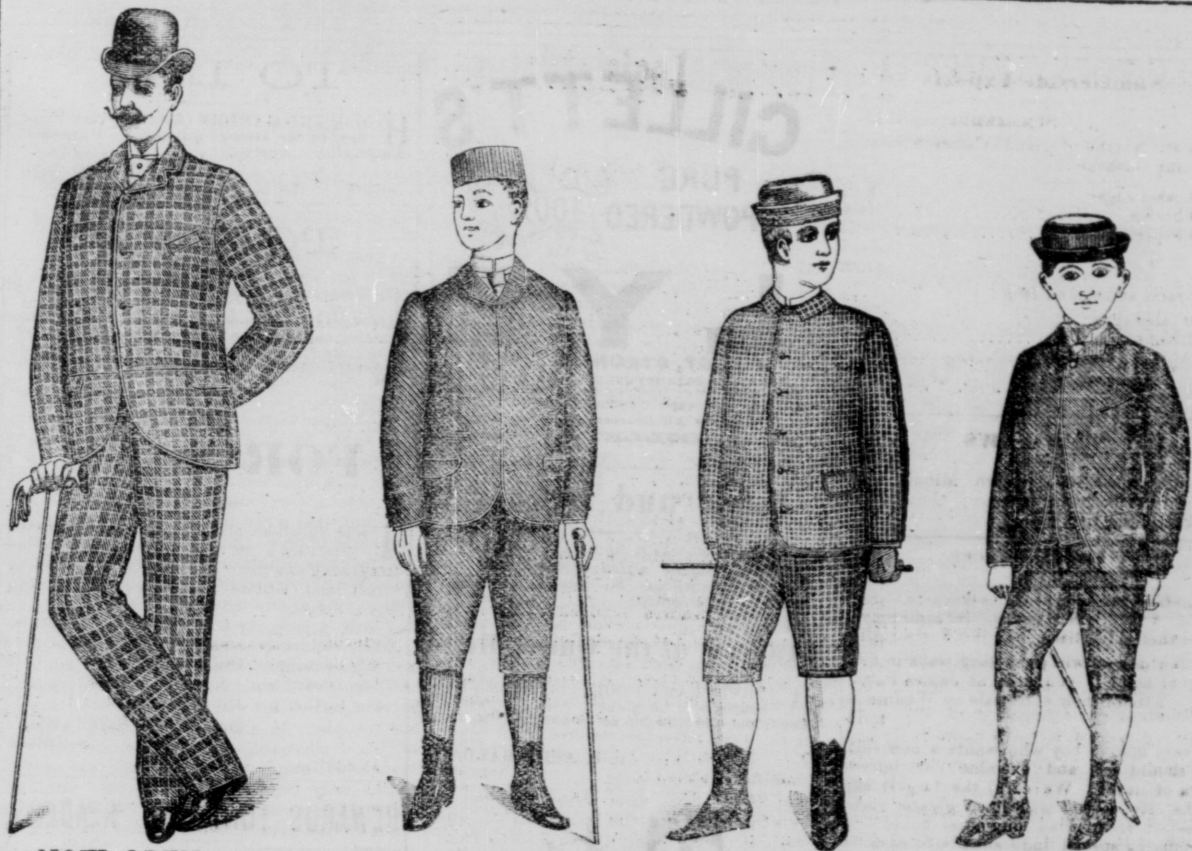
