

'Public's Man' In Baltimore Is Former Ch'town Resident

A former Charlottetown man, Wilfred T. McQuaid has been making an outstanding reputation for himself in Baltimore, Maryland, where he has represented the citizens of that city in a number of instances involving municipal affairs.

Mr. McQuaid was recently appointed to represent the public

Leaving the Island at the age of 17, he went to Baltimore and graduated from Loyola University and later from the University of Maryland where he was class president for three years.

FORMER MAGISTRATE

A lawyer by profession, Mr. McQuaid has formerly served as a Traffic Court Magistrate from 1931 to 1933 was assistant United States attorney before going into private practice. Following his tenure as traffic court magistrate from 1952 to 1955, he took over the people's counsel post.

During the past year, his official duties have seen him successfully argue for the reduction of the rate rise application of the Chesapeake and Potomac Electric Company; file suit against the Public Service Commission to nullify its decision to increase rates charged by the Baltimore Gas and Electric Company; lead the opposition to the pending five-cent fare increase application charged by the Baltimore Transit Company.

PUBLIC MAN

When not pursuing his "fights" for the public, Mr. McQuaid carries on his private practice which he began following his graduation from the University of Maryland.

In a recent feature interview in the Baltimore Evening Sun with the Island born lawyer, entitled "The Public's Man", Mr. McQuaid ".... sees himself as a representative of the public, not the Public Service Commission. The commission's task is to balance the public interest with that of the utilities."

It goes on to say that the ".... people's counsel is not a balance. The public interest is his only responsibility."

A sister, Miss Agnes McQuaid, is one of the City librarians.

Rural Teachers Favour 5-Day Cut In School Yr.

The cutting of five days from the standard school year was advocated in a resolution approved yesterday at the wind-up session of the Charlottetown Rural Teachers two-day convention. The resolution asked that the normal requirement of 200 days be reduced to 195.

The chief speaker at yesterday's session was Miss Mabel Matheson, Provincial President of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation. Stan McInnis, Director, Visual Education, conducted a demonstration and discussion on the use of filmstrip in the classroom.

Harry Kiely was elected 1958-59 President of the Charlottetown Rural Teachers Local. Other officers elected were: Marshall Konderson as Vice President and Miss Christine MacLeod as Secretary.

ADVOCATE BOARD

The organizing of a Board to set and correct the Grade 10 Matriculation Examinations was also urged in a resolution submitted by the committee.

Other resolutions included the request that some special remuneration be given to teachers holding degrees; and that the thanks of the convention be extended to Dr. MacKinnon for the use of the auditorium; to Miss Estelle Bowness, Malcolm MacKenzie, Mr. Ross, Mr. Wood, Mrs. Devlin and to all others who contributed to the success of the convention.

Miss Matheson spoke briefly on the role of teachers as individuals and as members of their professional organization stressing the function of the local association.

She went on to show how they could increase their contribution to the various activities of the Local.

Miss Matheson also spoke briefly on the Canadian College of Teachers; the first Canadian Conference on Education, and of the P.E.I. Convention of Education to be held November 8.

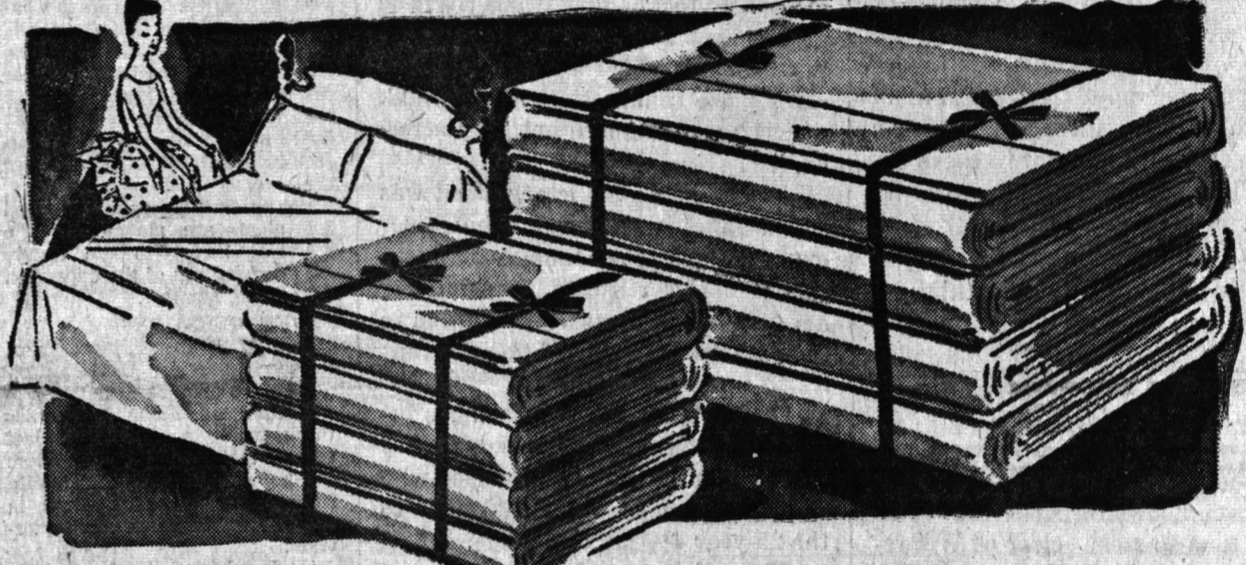
