THE death of Judge Fisher, of New Brunswick, is announced.

THE mails per "Northern Light" will arrive at the usual time to-night.

THE Court of Chancery met to-day to hear the case of Alley vs. Duchemin.

POLICEMAN MALONE, who was on trial in St. John for shooting John McFarlane, has been acquitted.

THE Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island, A. F. & A. M., will meet in Georgetown on Wednesday next.

THE City Council meets on Monday evening. This will probably be the last meeting of the Council this year.

THIBAUT has been found guilty of the murder of Charlotte Hill, at Annapolis. He will be hanged on the 8th February next.

JOSEPH R. LEGGETT, who won the walking match here last summer, is on the Island again. He is staying at the Osborne House.

THE Law Society of New Brunswick have held a meeting and paid a handsome tribute of respect to the late S. R. Thompson, Q. C.

YESTERDAY'S north-east wind filled Picton Harbor with drift ice. The "Mayflower" is still plying between Picton and Picton Landing.

THE "Northern Light" arrived in Georgetown last evening at 8.30 p. m. The train, with mails and passengers, arrived here at 11.30 p. m.

C. T. A.—A proclamation has been published in the *Canada Gazette*, declaring that the C. T. Act shall come in force in Queen's County in August next.

THE Gammell Will Case, in Sydney, ended by the Court declaring the wills bearing date 21st April, 1879, to be the last will of William Gammell.—Thus Mrs. Gammell is sustained.

AMONG the many who, just now, labor under the deepest affliction are the family of the Hon. Daniel Davies. An only son, a bright and promising lad, died last evening. The bereaved ones have the sympathy of the community.

JOHN BROWN, a boy of 16, was arrested by the police for vagrancy. He appeared at the Court this forenoon. As there are several charges of larceny against Brown which require investigation, he was remanded to jail for eight days.

THE schooner "Chamelon," Capt. McDonald, from Crapaud, for Souris with produce, encountered a gale on the night of November 31st, and split her sails and broke her gaff; she ran to Port Hawkesbury for shelter.

REV. G. W. HODGSON, arrived home from St. John last night. While in St. John, he delivered to a large audience, a lecture entitled "The Canadian element in the future of Canada." The St. John papers published appreciative reports of the lecture.

THE brig "Fanny," of Swansea, from Prince Edward for Queenstown, with a cargo of oats, was abandoned at sea Nov. 28. Crew have been landed at Liverpool. The "Fanny" was owned by Hon. William Richards, and sailed from Summerside on the 12th of November.

JOHN McDONALD (Happy Jack the bag-piper) was arrested this forenoon for stealing a cowhide from Mr. Charles Reilly. John seized the cowhide at Mr. Reilly's door, and hid it in a stable off Richmond street. Mr. Reilly, knowing John to be a thief, seized him and gave him into custody. The hide was afterwards found in the stable.

A LARGE number of sailing vessels have arrived at the Gut of Canso the past week. Many of them were blown a long distance out of their course in the late storm, and many of them had their sails partly destroyed, and they are now repairing them before they proceed on their voyages.

Educational Institute.

THE Educational Institute last evening was very largely attended. Mr. Smith's paper was a capital introduction to the topic under study, "How best to secure good attendance at school." Among the points suggested by the speaker, and touched on by the other speakers, were these: How far the payment of fees, as was required under the old Act, fostered the interest of parents in sending their children to school; whether education is not now made so cheap, especially to remiss taxpayers, as to make them regard school privileges as a matter of choice; whether it would be wise to have a Reformatory for pupils who will not fall in with the regular work of schools; how far the compulsory clauses are needed or carried out, and what means are best to put an end to vagrancy, such as the interference of the police or the appointment of a truant officer. These subjects were treated by Messrs. J. M. Duncan, A. A. McKenzie, J. McSwain and Dr. Murray. Mr. H. Lawson thought the secret of good attendance lay in the interest shown by teachers in their class-work, and ventured to say that in this city those departments are best attended which are best and most cheerily taught. Statistics of school attendance were furnished by the Superintendent of Education, some having inquired the extent of non-attendance and vagrancy on which to base their proposed remedies. Altogether, a pleasant and not unprofitable discussion took place.
