

## Mainland Entries At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — Tonight at Summerside Raceway, three speedsters from Nova Scotia will be here to do battle with 11 of the Island's best horses.

Onway, the clunderena horse, owned by Dick Driscoll, Halifax has been established the favorite and well he might be, as he is yet to lose a dash in an early closing event, and has amassed a record of 13 wins in 1966.

Rowland Delight and Wild Chance, a stable entry from the Wheby Stables will be going all out for top honors in each division. Wild Chance, only two years old is said to be a more promising prospect than Andy's Son, when he was the same age. Rowland Delight has been pacing consistently around 209 this year and is considered to be one of the top three year olds of 1966.

Little Art, Donnaway, Mr. McElwyn Key, Jazzman have been made the choice of the Island entries but Amos Frost, Amy Thorpe, Al Dale, Chiefs G & L, Doc Wilson, Speaker Pick, and Mountain Marie all have an equal chance of being the horses that will be in the "race off" which will be for the winners of each of the four dashes.

But Manager Al Dark's batting As, a crew of rookie pitchers and fielders picked up from a number of teams in last-minute trades, have won 12 of the last 19 games, including their last three in a row.

And the standings after games on Independence Day, the traditional halfway mark of the season, show that the A's jokingly referred to in past years as a New York Yankee farm club because of their many trades, have won one more game than the Yanks.

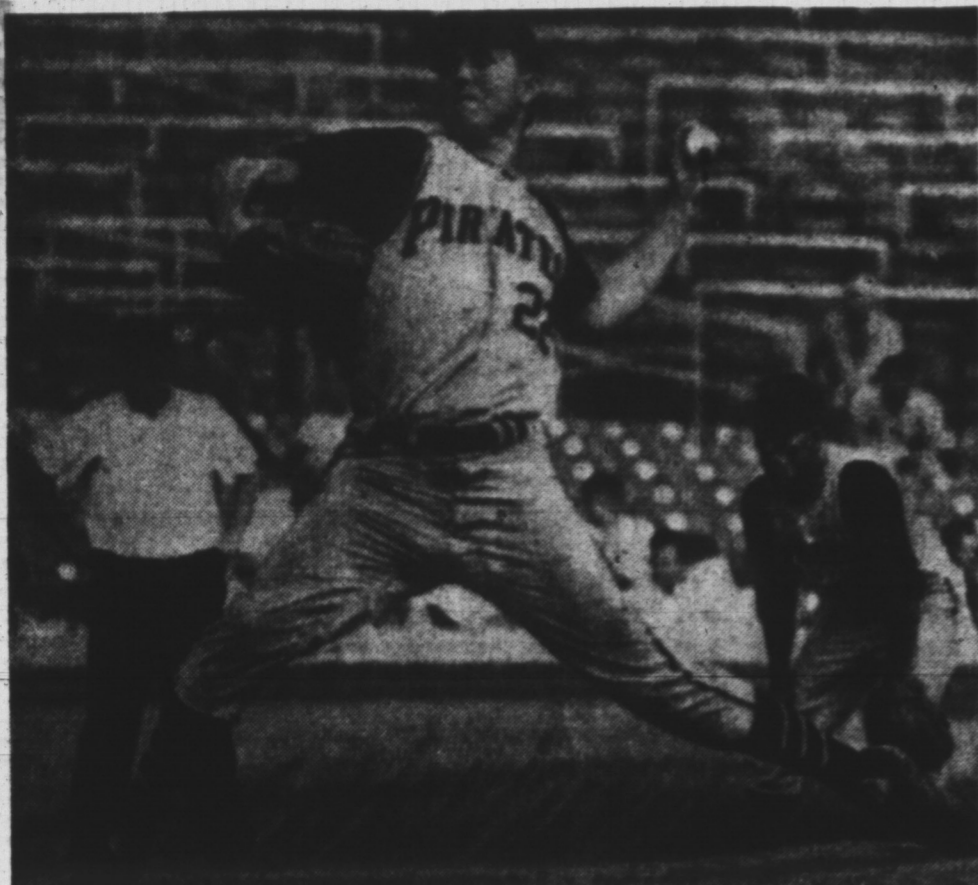
