SUDDEN DEATHS.—While going to church on Sunday last with his wife and children, Harry Sutton, aged 60, of Springhill, Cumberland, N. S., dropped dead. The cause of death was heart disease.

Mrs. Josiah Allen, of Bayside, Westmorland Co., N. B., died suddenly on Tuesday, at the residence of her son Jacob. She was in her usual health at noon, but dropped dead when at her work. The cause is supposed to be heart disease.

ROBBERY OF THE MAIL.—Samuel Hollingsworth, the third mail clerk arrested in connection with the recent mail robberies, was sentenced at Ottawa a day or two ago to five years hard labor in Kingston penitentiary. It is expected that another of the gang will be captured in a few days. They had made a practice of watching for letters from Italians working on railways addressed to their families, knowing as a rule that they contained money.

The Tables Turned.

ALBERT E. AN EASY WINNER THIS TIME.

But one heat of the match race for \$100 a side between the pacers Albert E. and Harry G. came off this afternoon and that was easily won by the former in 2.40. At the start Albert had a slight lead over Harry, who broke badly at the first turn. By the time he had regained his feet Albert had increased his lead by several lengths. Before reaching the quarter Albert also broke, but soon settled down again drawing away from his opponent, who was not acting up to expectation, and leading him some fifty yards at the quarter. There was no perceptible reduction of this space between the quarter and half, but between the half and three-quarters, Brown pushed Albert a little harder and increased his lead, shooting past the three-quarter some seventy or eighty yards ahead. After passing the three-quarter Steele began running Harry to save his distance, and when Albert passed under the wire Harry was but a length or so on the safe side of the distance flag.

At the close, the driver of Albert E. (Brown) protested against Steele's running Harry to save his distance, and the judges—J. J. Davies, W. S. McKie and A. N. Large—after consultation gave the best and race to Albert E.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Catholic Congress

BALTIMORE, Nov. 12.

In the Catholic Congress, Edmund L. Dennie, of Florida, treated extemporaneously the right of the State in education, and his humorous digressions so caught the delegates that his time was extended over and over by general consent. Recent events in Boston were particularly the target of his sarcasm. The committee on the Platform to-night presented a document to the Assembly which was adopted unanimously. The Platform declared the Church must continue to support its own schools and multiply them. It denounces Mormonism and intemperance, and condemns Nihilism, Socialism, Communism and heartless greed of capital. It favors the amelioration and promotion of the physical and moral culture of the negroes, the Christian teaching of Indians by the Government, advocates alliances with non-Catholics for promoting proper observance of Sunday, favors the enactment of laws rigidly closing saloons on Sunday, and forbidding the sale of liquors to minors and intoxicated persons, and demands that the absolute freedom of the Holy See be respected by all secular governments. Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul, closed the congress which adjourned sine die.

Mercier's Speech Criticised.

TORONTO, Nov. 12.

In an article entitled "Not One Dollar," the Empire criticised Mercier's speech, and declared against the Quebec Premier's expressed intention to look to Ottawa for an increase of subsidy. The Empire says the people of Ontario will never consent to bear a share of Mr. Mercier's jaunts to the Jesuits, if Mr. Mercier and the province of Quebec choose to squander their resources in recognizing what they are pleased to term moral claims. While it is their own money they are spending in that way, we do not think the people of Ontario can properly interfere with them. But when the Quebec Premier having depleted his treasury in this way announces his intention of calling on the Dominion to come to his assistance financially, it becomes a question with which we have a right to deal, and we are called upon to speak out.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.

The Cabinet were in council all day. Among the matters disposed of was the appointment of Hon. W. W. Sullivan as Chief Justice of P. E. Island.

French Canadians have expressed themselves as deeply humiliated by the flippant utterances of Mr. Mercier at Baltimore.

A private telegram received here from an active supporter of the victorious party in Newfoundland expresses the opinion that union with Canada has been greatly hastened by the results of the elections.

The proposal to have a winter carnival at Ottawa is being vigorously canvassed with prospects of success.

The Cretan Troubles.

LONDON, Nov. 12.

A Blue Book on the Cretan troubles has just been published. It shows that Greece, early in August, was preparing to send an expedition to Crete, but the powers restrained her. Lord Salisbury in one despatch said England would consult with her allies. As the Prime Minister heretofore avocated that England had no allies, the phase is likely to cause a sensation.

Mr. Van Horne has invited the Mayor and Aldermen of Montreal to an excursion to Minneapolis over the Soo Line and return via Winnipeg and Port Arthur. The invitation has been accepted, and they will leave next week.
