S'ide High School Sets Record Again

For the second successive year pupils of Summerside High School have all passed the entrance examinations. Last year 22 out of 22 were successful, and this year 34 out of 34. Donald Gillis had 97 in Mathematics and 94 in Arithmetic. This was very close to the top mark in each subject. Irene Mountain won a Provincial Scholarship and Mary Cairns, a Bell Scholarship.

Mossadegh Foe Dies After Street Fight

TEHRAN, (AP)—An opponent of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh died Sunday from wounds suffered in a street battle as this capital awaited the opening of a controversial national plebiscite on the premier's policies. The dead man is Mirza Hadadpur, 50, a business man supporter of Ayatullah Seyed Abolghassem Kashani, fiery religious leader and spearhead of Mossadegh's political opposition. His head was crushed by a stone and he was knifed near the heart Saturday night in a three-cornered pitched battle among government and opposition supporters and Iranian soldiers and police in front of Kashani's house. The battle lasted almost two hours.

Kashani holds authority roughly comparable with that of a bishop in Christian countries. The outbreak at his house, the second last week, followed the boycott he had pronounced earlier on the plebiscite by saying that "no patriotic Moslem" would vote in it. Kashani used the Arabic word "haram" forbidden by religion, which could have deep meaning for Iran's 15,000,000 Moslems.

Iranians will express their views on dissolution of the Majlis, lower house of Parliament, now reduced to a rump body of only 23 opposition deputies. Mossadegh's supporters and their allies resigned to protest the opposition's delaying tactics on legislation that would give the premier greater powers.

Voting in the plebiscite is scheduled to begin today only in Tehran and two nearby districts, with voting elsewhere expected to take place later.

Kashani opposed the plebiscite on the ground that it is not a constitutional way to dissolve the Majlis.

Will Try To Form New Italian Gov't

ROME (AP)—Atilio Piccioni, 61-year-old advocate of a go-slow reform policy for Italy agreed provisionally Sunday to try and form a new government. The Christian Democrat who helped pioneer aviation in Italy conferred for three hours with President Luigi Einaudi. Piccioni then told newspapermen he would start a round of discussions aimed at putting together a cabinet.

Piccioni, who was an outspoken foe of fascism throughout the Mussolini era, said he would meet with former premier Alcide De Gasperi and president of the Italian Chamber of Deputies and Senate before giving a final reply to Einaudi. The chamber refused to give De Gasperi a vote of confidence last week.

De Gasperi, a firm friend of the United States and Western democracy who headed eight postwar Italian governments, will be offered the ministry of foreign affairs, which he held in the last government.

But as leader of the right wing of the centre Christian Democrat party, Piccioni is expected to elow up on land reform and edge closer to conservatism if he becomes prime minister. De Gasperi is considered more liberal than Piccioni.

Egyptians Set Two English Channel Records

WISSANT, France, (AP)—Egyptian swimmers established two English channel records today but Florence Chadwick, 33-year-old San Diego, Calif., typist, who twice has conquered the testing 25 miles, failed in her third attempt. Miss Chadwick, who swam across the tricky stretch of water in each direction, started out to swim it non-stop both ways. Abd Littif Abou Heif, 23 figured in both records for swimming from England to the French coast. He was a member of the six-man Egyptian team which hung up a relay record of 10 hours and 51 minutes and then lowered the individual mark of 13 hours 45 minutes. Abou Heif swam one of the early legs of about four miles as a member of the team and shortly afterwards struck out alone from the English shore. The individual record of 13 hours, 35 minutes was made by Tom Blower of England in 1948. Grand Manan Island in the Bay of Fundy, 22 miles long and five miles wide, has several good harbors.

One Man Loses Life In Maine Forest Fire

SANFORD, Maine, (AP)—Hundreds of firefighters backed up by tons of equipment Sunday night maintained control over a two-day forest fire that has charred some 2,400 acres and taken one life. A separate, smaller fire which broke out Saturday some eight miles from the main blaze and blackened 200 acres, erupted again Sunday and burned about six acres but was reported "in good shape."

A total of some 2,000 firefighters battled the blaze in shifts before it was controlled late Saturday night. The fire originated in a farm machine shop and trapped veteran Springfield fireman Corydon Goodwin, 66, when it spread to nearby woods.

Wilkins said other fires, all small and under control, were reported today in Brunswick, Windham and Alton.
