Snow Plows Busy In Montague Area

Heavy drifting snow Saturday and yesterday brought out the government snow plows in an attempt to maintain open traffic routes, particularly along main highways. The highway from Montague to Charlottetown was cleared Saturday, but continued drifting made certain portions difficult to pass.

The plow stationed at Montague was taken to Charlottetown on Saturday for repairs, and continued its work yesterday evening clearing the highway from Charlottetown to Montague, Georgetown, and Cardigan early last evening.

The plow stationed at Annandale has cleared the road to Dundas, Rollo Bay and Souris, and back to join at Cardigan.

Owing to a breakdown of the plow at Murray River, a special plow was sent out from Charlottetown and the road last evening was clear from Montague to Murray River and Murray Harbour.

Continued drifting will cause difficulty in certain places. However, the general outlook is that all main routes will be open for traffic today.
