Free Bowl Of Spuds Parlayed To Fortune

VANCOUVER (CP)—A fresh-faced, chubby business executive this week announced that his firm would purchase equipment to raise its milling rate from 3,300 tons of copper concentrate a day to 10,000 tons a day. H. H. (Spud) Huestis, president of Bethlehem Copper Corporation also announced that the company had made its final payment on a five-year loan two years and 15 days after production began. The picture of expansion and prosperity was a different one from that Spud Huestis presented 35 years ago when he stumbled into the town of Waverly, Alta. Exhausted and starving after days of wandering the countryside lost for five days while searching for mineral wealth, he burst into a restaurant and began to wolf down a bowl of hot potatoes on the counter. The cook was understanding: "That's okay, son," he said. "Keep on eatin' I don't need to know your name—I'll just call you Spud."
