TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.

In the House of Commons to-day the address in reply to the speech from the Throne was moved by Mr. Pope and seconded by Mr. Prior, who spoke briefly eulogizing the Government's policy in general terms.

Mr. Laurier, on rising to reply, was loudly cheered. He denied the statement that the country was in a most prosperous condition. The Canadian Pacific, he went on to say, was discriminating against the farmers of the Northwest in favor of Americans, by charging higher rates for carrying wheat from Manitoba to Canadian ports than from St. Paul to American ports on the Atlantic. He said there was not an industry in the country that would not be benefited by reciprocity. He condemned the course of the Government with respect to the Behring Sea question, and urged that Canada should have the right of negotiating direct with regard to such a matter.

Sir John Macdonald insisted that the country was prosperous, notwithstanding the assertions to the contrary, and believed that the mass of the people were satisfied. He thought the Government would be able to answer the charges of vacillation preferred against them. The mover and seconder of the address, who came from different parts of the Dominion, had testified that the country was in a prosperous condition and that the National Policy was not a failure. He was glad that the Opposition had adopted a policy of free trade with the United States and believed the Conservative party would remain in power after he (Sir John) had disappeared.

The address was then passed and the House adjourned till Monday.

NOTES.

Mr. Taylor has given notice of a bill to prohibit the bringing of foreign laborers into Canada under contract.

Mr. Perry intends asking if the P. E. I. Government has withdrawn any further amounts from the capital in the hands of the Federal Government.

The Northwest members are urging the introduction of special legislation against Polygamy.

ENGLAND AND PORTUGAL.

The Trouble Continues.

LISBON, Jan. 17.

The Scudop published to-day an unsigned manifesto headed "The Directory of the Portuguese Republicans to the Nation." It denounces vociferously the English ultimatum, and advocates a Republican confederation of the later nations, and adhesion of Portuguese to such federation. It declares that the movement with federation of the Latin Republics is steadily making great progress. The manifesto does not advise a revolution in Portugal at the present moment, is moderate in tone throughout except as to the denunciation of England's action. All papers, republican as well as others, advise prudence and moderation in the present crisis. The extravagance of the schoolboys in the streets and the demonstrations seem to have opened the eyes of the men of the country to the folly and danger of their way of treating international difficulties.

Mobs of workmen and sailors parade the streets denouncing England. The Englishmen employed by the government have been given the alternative of dismissal or naturalization. English flags have been bought and publicly burned in several towns. The rumor of a British fleet in the Tagus has had a tranquilizing effect upon the papers.

LONDON, Jan. 17.

The Portuguese correspondence was published yesterday in a blue book. The News, commenting upon the despatches, says that they confirm the opinion that the Marquis of Salisbury spoiled a very strong case by undue haste. His despatches insult Senhor Gomez, by implying disbelief in Senhor Gomez word. It is doubtful whether any further negotiations will be possible between the governments for a long time.

The New Party.

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.

L'Electeur says, referring to the present session of the Dominion Parliament, that a party will be formed by the Equal Rights, which will have the effect of putting both the Government and Opposition in a delicate position.

From St. John's.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Jan. 17.

Government candidates were returned at the by-elections by large majorities. The collection in St. John's in aid of the Harbor Grace Cathedral amounts to eight thousand dollars.

Another Delegation.

MONTREAL, Jan. 17.

The bankers who attended the recent meeting here will proceed to Ottawa shortly to hold conference with the Government regarding the proposed change in the Banking Act.

Balfour's Opinion.

LONDON, Jan. 17.

Balfour, in a speech delivered at Maidstone to-night, ridiculed the rumor that parliament was to be dissolved.

To the Electors of Charlottetown, Common and Royalty.

GENTLEMEN,—Thanking you for the liberal support you have given me in the last three General Elections, and having again been nominated a candidate for the representation of your interests in the House of Assembly, I now seek your suffrages. After the promotion of the Hon. W. W. Sullivan to a seat on the Supreme Court Bench of this Province, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor entrusted me with the formation of a Government.

Having accomplished the formation of a Government, it was deemed proper, in view of the number of partial elections required to be held in consequence of the vacancies created and the nearness of the completion of the term of the present Parliament, to consult the electors by means of a General Election before entering on new legislation.

Agriculture being the main industry of the Province, measures will be adopted which will best render the labor of the husbandman remunerative, by increasing the aid given to the Annual Exhibitions, by the importation of improved stock, and by providing instruction on Agricultural Chemistry and a course of popular lectures on agricultural subjects.

In order to give greater shipping facilities, and until the Dominion Government shall have taken over all the wharves that became the property of the Dominion Government at the time of Confederation, it is our policy to keep in repair such of them as are essential to the trade of the locality where they are respectively built.

As in the past, our policy is to vigorously press to a settlement our claims against the Federal Government. Rigorous economy will be practiced in the expenditure of public money, while at the same time liberal provision will be made for the public service.

Pending the adjustment of our claims against the Federal Government, our annual resources may not be sufficient to carry out the proposals indicated, and at the same time provide for the large expenditure required for our educational system. In that case, such measures to supplement our revenue will be adopted as will bear the least heavily on the people, and will at the same time be just and equitable.

Changes will be made in the public service in order to secure efficiency and greater security to the public interests.
