New Zealand's Prime Minister Sydney Holland, announced a volunteer artillery outfit will be sent. He did not give the size of the probable force.

Conservative Leader Winston Churchill told the House the opposition would support any measures "which seem right or necessary."
In a comment on Shinwell's references to Russian strength in Europe, Churchill said: "One would have thought that his colleagues here only just come into power and that the situation had developed overnight, whereas it has been building up for at least three years during which the Allied forces were falling and Russia's strength was steadily being maintained and strengthened in every way."
Churchill also said a large proportion of the munitions available at the end of the war, if they had not been imprudently used, would now be available for
