LORD'S DAY OBSERVANCE BILL.

Another straw which shows which way the wind blows in the grit camp is the strained relations which now exist between Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. Mulock, consequent upon Mr. Mulock refusing to sit down at the bidding of the former.

One of the events of the week was the visit to the Experimental Farm by some 200 members of the Senate, Commons and Press Gallery on the special invitation of Hon. John Carling, Minister of Agriculture.

A bill, introduced by the Minister of Marine respecting the inspection of ships, provides that the inspector, who now confines his investigation to the condition of hulls, shall be authorized to inspect ships, tackle, rigging, &c., thus affording greater protection to sailors.

The Government intend asking a vote from Parliament to erect a statue to Sir John Macdonald, and it will probably be placed immediately in front of the tower at the head of the stone steps approaching the Parliament building.

For the solace of Mr. A. B. McKenzie and his friends I may say that a bill entitled an Act to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day has been agreed upon by the special committee to whom it was referred for consideration and report some weeks ago.

The civic debt of Halifax is steadily growing. The commissioners of schools have added considerably to the debt for school premises, and the total debt of the city is now stated to be: For general purposes, \$1,100,427.98; for water department, \$811,906.48; for public schools, \$231,144.06—total \$2,143,478.56.
