Work To Start On Water Main

In an effort to improve fire protection in the old section of Charlottetown, workmen will begin next week to install a new and larger water main along

Grafton and Church Streets to Richmond Street. Sidney Green, chairman of the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply, said that the construction will cause a little inconvenience as possible to motorists, because the lines will be laid inside the curb where feasible.

Department workmen have been occupied recently in bringing the added water supply to the southeast section by installing 2,600 feet of new eight-inch main from Longworth Ave. east down Victory Avenue to Euston to Edward to Grafton to Cumberland streets.

This is considered particularly necessary in the area and will give far better protection—and internal plant pressure—to Canada Packers. At present, there is only a small four-inch main carrying water to that area. At the same time a new hydrant will be installed from the corner of Grafton and Edward Streets.

BATES LOWEST

Male porters receive from \$130 a month, maintain a few men painters, electricians, etc. receive from \$175; while firemen are getting from \$185. All of these, he said, are the lowest rates in the Maritime Province hospitals.

In objecting to the government's attitude, he pointed out that 80 per cent of hospital costs are paid by the federal government under the Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Program in Canada.

Mr. MacMillan said the locals were only bargaining for 120 people; they do not represent the registered nurses or professional staff, nor the civil service employees in government hospitals.

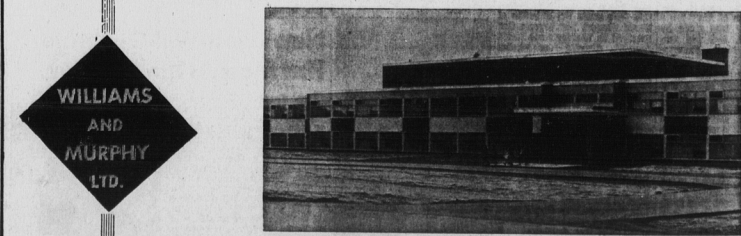

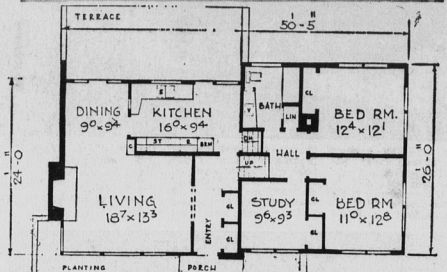
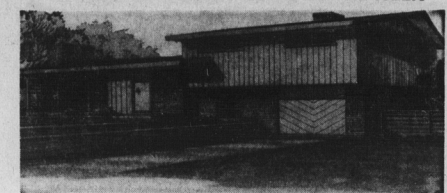

The meeting was adjourned and a social evening, including refreshments was enjoyed.

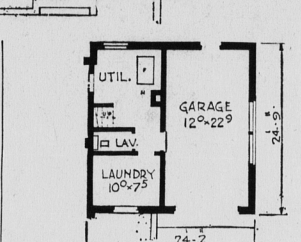

Interpretations Turned Down, Hosp. Unions Seek Legal Aid

"We do not accept the interpretation by the minister of labor and we maintain the un-

ion has the right to take a strike vote" John F. MacMillan, Saint John, N.B., regional director of the National Union of Public Employees, said yesterday.

Mr. MacMillan made the statement following Thursday night's meeting of Locals 805 and 826 of hospital workers at which members voiced a flat refusal of the minister's interpretation of sections 41 and 44 of the Industrial Relations Act.

He stated that the taking of such a vote does not indicate that a strike will be called out. At the meeting both Mr. MacMillan and M.A. Hughes, Saint John, were empowered to take what action is deemed necessary and it was also decided that both locals will engage legal counsel.

NOTICE

To Persons Dispensing or Purchasing Flammable Liquids
FLAMMABLE LIQUID CODE SECTIONS 6240 - 6250

"No delivery of any Class I or Class II flammable liquids shall be made into a portable container of 5 gallon capacity or less. Unless the container is of sound metal construction; has a tight closer with screw on or spring cover; and is fitted with a spout or so designed that contents can be poured without spilling."

"No sale or purchase of any Class I, II or III flammable liquids shall be made in containers unless such containers are clearly marked with the name of the product contained therein."

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
