

Abbies And Peter Watson Win Honors At Mar. Meet

Sub-Lt. Peter Watson of H. M. E. S. Cornwallis captured the S. F. Doyle Memorial Trophy for the highest point aggregate at the Maritime Championships track and field meet held at Memorial Field on Saturday afternoon.

Watson, a native of Toronto, was five points up on his nearest rival Dave MacLeod of the Abbies who scored 18 points and who was last year's winner of the Doyle trophy.

The Abbies with a high point total of 48 were 9 up on Amherst to win the Premier MacNair trophy.

Cool weather and a brisk wind kept Maritime records well out of reach of the competing athletes and only one of the existing Memorial Field records was cracked. The feat was accomplished by Sandy Patterson, a heavily-built athlete hailing from Boston, Mass., who hurled the discus 130 ft. 14 ins. to beat "Tink" Kyt's old mark by 16 feet 3 3/4 inches.

In racking up his 23 point total, Watson took first in the mile, half mile, quarter-mile, 220 yards and placed second behind Dave MacLeod in the 100 yard dash.

Howard McCurdy, a negro athlete from Windsor, who attended Michigan State University, showed up well with first place finishes

in the High Jump, Running board and second in the hopstep and jump.

The meet was under the distinguished patronage of Lieut. Governor T. W. L. Prowse, who presented the winning athletes with their trophies and medals. Attending his honor was Lt-Col. A. W. Rogers.

Premier A. W. Matheson was also present to present trophies and a special guest was Neil A. Matheson, M. P., an old-time field man, who could possibly still have given the younger athletes a run for their laurels had he so desired.

Canning Wins N.S.-P.E.I. Junior Baseball Ch'ship

A smart band of baseball players from Canning, N. S., run off with the N. S. — P. E. I. Junior baseball title at Memorial Field over the weekend by sweeping both games against the Junior Abbies 10-1 Saturday night and pulled through to a 2-1 win in Sunday's 10-inning thriller.

Paul Jay and Jim O'Regan hooked up in a tight pitcher's duel and it looked for a time that the locals were going to cop the win as they pushed across their lone run in the sixth frame while holding the visitors scoreless. But Bourgeois started the Abbies on their downfall as he led off the last of the ninth with a long double into center. He went to third on Buck Kelly's single and came racing in with the tying run when Rip Read allowed an infield throw to slip through him.

After getting two out Jay walked Bob Balcom to load the sacks but struck out pitcher Icton, who replaced O'Regan in the ninth, retire the side.

The Abbies could do nothing in the top of the tenth, Bill Wade of Canning got a single in the last of the tenth with one out. He raced to third on a throwing error. Bourgeois laid down a bunt that went for a hit but Wade was unable to score.

With runners on first and third the Abbies selected to give Kelly an intentional pass. But Jay cut out on the pitches too close to the plate and Kelly belted the second baseman a Bobb and, in time to nail Wade, "sn't" O'Regan pitched masterly ball for Canning giving up only hits until he was taken out for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

Jay was hit more liberally allowing 10 blows, but kept them well spaced and was poison in the clutch.

Bourgeois led all hitters with four hits, including a double, in five trips while Kelly slammed out three hits in four tries. Coleman, Wade and Fox got the other Canning blows, all singles.

Bill Purcell led the Abbies with two, singles and Ken MacDonald slammed a double. Ready and Donnie LeClair got the other hits.

Terry Icton hurled a brilliant 2-hitter at the Abbies to take the win and sent eight batters down swinging.

The Canning nine climbed on starting and losing pitcher Ronnie Stanley and Vern Handrahan for 13 blows, including a long triple by Bill Kennedy.

Stanley retired from the game after stopping a hot, low liner hit by Bud Kelly that resulted in a broken thumb for the young pitcher. Previous to that Stanley had allowed two runners to get on a fielder's choice and a base-hit, both of whom scored later, on a passed ball and the other on Fox's hit. Fox advanced to third on Kennedy's hit and scored on a wild pitch.

After that Canning never looked back, adding one in the fifth three in the seventh, one more in the eighth and two in the ninth.

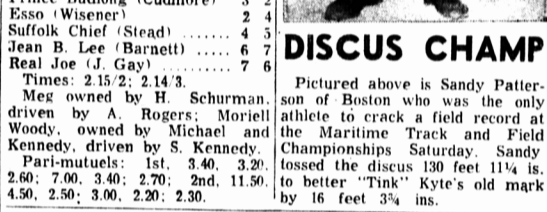
