SUMMERSIDE—The Rt. Rev. R.H. Waterman Lord Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of N.S. administered the sacrament of confirmation to candidates at St. Mark's Church, Kensington, Monday evening.

His Lordship, in addressing the congregation admonished the candidates to diligently practice the vows they had taken by renounc-

ing what is evil, believing what is true, and doing what is right. Speaking on the work of the layman in the church he mentioned the great value of the sector plan, in stewardship of time, talent, and treasure, and noted with pleasure the number of men of the parish who gave of their time and talent in the recent improvements made to the rectory property.

Two young men of the parish were installed as parochial lay readers by His Lordship, and assisted in the service, Charles Gillispie by carrying the bishop's staff, and William Pidgeon by

reading the scripture in the order for administering the sacrament of the laying on of hands in confirmation.

Potatoes: Shipments are heavy and demand very strong. The price to grower advanced from \$1.15 to \$1.60 per 75 lb. bulk Canada No. 1 grade delivered at shipping points in buyers' bags.

Turnips: Shipments continued

steadily with price unchanged from last week.

Other vegetables: Home markets are well supplied with good quality vegetables with some carrots, parsnips and cabbage going to Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.

Island Presbytery Is Third In Donations To New School

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island at its meeting Tuesday was advised that it stands third in all Canada in percentage of allocation raised for the new Deaconess Training School in Toronto, and first of the eight Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. This information was given out by the Rev. E. H. Bean, convener of presbytery's committee for the Deaconess Building Fund.

The moderator, Rev. D. A. Campbell presided, with the clerk, Rev. T.H.B. Somers, at the desk. In addition, the following ministers were present: Rev. Donald Nicholson, Rev. M.C. Currie, Rev. L.M. MacNaughton, Rev. E.H. Bean, Rev. Geo. Killen, Rev. Chas. Townsley, Rev. J.Y. Garrett, Rev. R.E. MacKenzie, and Rev. R.D. Bhe.

Elders were also in attendance as follows: Percy MacPherson, D.

J. Riley, L.A. MacKinnon, J.S. Stavert, Elmer MacLeod, Daniel MacNevin, M. J. Fraser, George Johnston, W.E. Forbes, Harry Patterson, Truman Paynter.

Correspondence included requests for nomination of a dean for the Deaconess Training School, of a secretary for the stewardship and budget committee in succession of Dr. Neil Miller who passed away this summer, and notification that the memorial tablet to the late Rev. Daniel MacLean which had been in the Highfield Church is now, by order of the Presbytery, in the Churchhill Church with an added inscription of its original location.

Announcement was made of the appointment of Rev. J.C. Cooper as new assistant secretary for home missions.

SECRETARY NAMED

The court placed the name of Rev. H. F. Davidson of Chatham,

Ontario, before the board of administration for the secretaryship of the stewardship and budget committee.

Reporting as interim-moderator of Broadbent, Mr. Bean paid tribute to the student missionary, R. A. Syme of Montreal, and announced that the church was now entirely free of debt, had been repaired and painted.

Reporting on the New London Church, Mr. Bean listed improvements there and expressed the hope for an early settlement. Reporting for the Montague vacancy, Rev. M.C. Currie introduced the Rev. J.C. Carr who since Sept. 27 has been serving as pulpit supply at Montague, Cardigan and Lorne Valley. Mr. Carr is applying to be received into the Canadian church and will have his academic standards and records submitted to the general assembly's board of education by the presbytery's committee on colleges.

Reporting on Christian education committee work, Rev. Chas. Townsley reviewed a study he has been conducting on the use of church school literature and the appeal it makes to teachers.

It was reported that at the recent Thanksgiving weekend conference in Sydney that the young people from this Presbytery had the third largest representation of the eight presbyteries of the synod. Dr. Gordon MacLeann, formerly of Pittsburgh and Philadelphia but now retired in Sydney, was the theme speaker.

FALL SUPPER

Rev. L. M. MacNaughton as convener, evangelism and social action reported on the fall supper of the Presbytery Laymen's Council held in September in Zion Church when more than 300 were in attendance. Rev. E. H. Bean urged the fullest measure of support by Presbyterian people of the home and school movement in the province.

Reporting on property, the clerk, Rev. T.H.B. Somers, announced that L. A. MacKinnon had now completed the demolition of the Highfield Church as instructed to do so by the presbytery some months ago. Application is to be made to the church's board of trustees in Toronto for permission for the Highfield Cemetery trustees to use the land surrounding the church site for burial purposes as it immediately adjoins the Highfield Cemetery.

Rev. D.A. Campbell, P.E.I. director of the Presbyterian Synod Corporation, announced a meeting of all Class "A" shareholders in Zion Church on Nov. 4 at 2 p.m. Mr. Campbell is to attend a meeting of the directors in New Glasgow meanwhile.

The following were elected to office for the ensuing year: Moderator, Rev. Donald Nicholson; clerk, treasurer and statistics convener, Rev. T.H.B. Somers; missions; Rev. L. M. MacNaughton; property, Rev. J.D. MacKay; colleges, Rev. E.H. Bean; christian education, Rev. Chas. Townsley; evangelism and social action, Rev. R. D. Bhe; budget, Rev. J.Y. Garrett; session records, Rev. Geo. Killen; historical, Rev. L. M. MacNaughton.

The moderator-elect, Rev. Donald Nicholson, was called to the chair and installed by his predecessor, Rev. D.A. Campbell, who, on motion of the clerk, was warmly thanked for his services to the presbytery in the moderator's chair.

The next stated meeting of the presbytery is to be held in Zion Church Hall on Feb. 16.

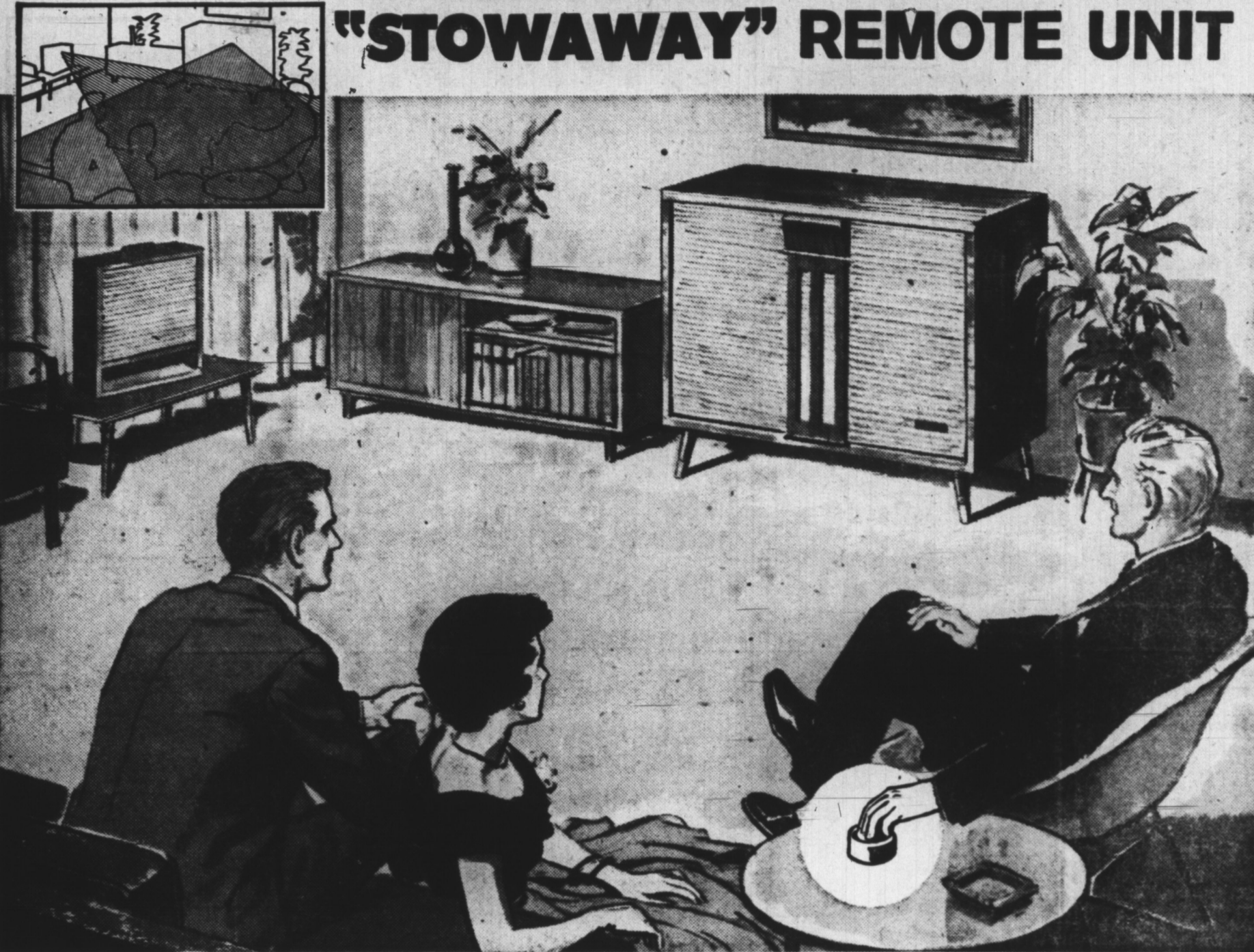

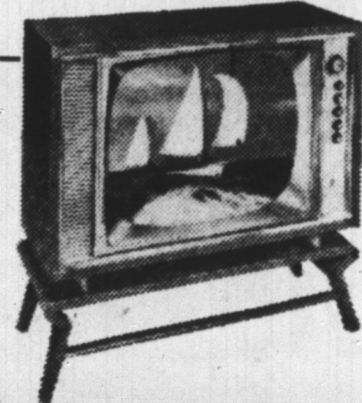
