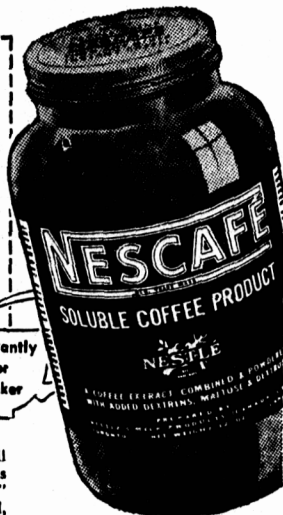

In the World of Books

With Will E. Bird

Author John Hersey is said to have sold the movie rights to THE WALL for \$100,000, plus a percentage of the picture's income, plus the reversion of the property rights after ten years. Production is scheduled for this fall.

THE PLYMOUTH ADVENTURE by Ernest Gellber; Doubleday; 377 pages; \$3.25.

This is not the usual historical novel; it is even better. It is really a chronicle of the voyage of the "Mayflower," the story of those who were the passengers, and the troubles they had in forming a settlement in the New World. Mr. Gellber had the idea of writing such a book after his perusal of a journal written by one of the settlers of New Plymouth. Before starting actual writing he made himself fully acquainted with the project by intensive research of all possible documents and records. The preparation he made is at once apparent when one begins to read his book.

The atmosphere of the time is given in the first chapter, when the first characters are introduced. The various trade had their rank, and the clothing a person wore largely denoted their station in life. City was scant and rarely served in any circumstance. Sanitation was unknown. There was no soap to waste and the majority thought that washing too often was harmful. The beliefs of the day were as varied as their holders. Yet there were many who had a strong spirit and the courage of their convictions. It was some of this type who packed the lower decks of the Mayflower and took

Over The Sea To Skye

EDINBURGH, May 2. - Some fifteen years ago, the chief of the MacLeods received at the historic castle of Dunvegan, a gathering of clansmen who had made their way to Skye from all parts of the world. There were Polish MacLeods; there were German MacLeods; indeed scarcely a country was not represented by MacLeods, many of whom had lost the original spelling of their name but had retained throughout the generations of exile the love of their ancestral island.

This gathering of the MacLeods will be repeated in May during "Skye Week," when Flora MacLeod of MacLeod - now chief of the great clan - will welcome her kinsmen.

Skye Week (May 20-27), will be opened at the island's capital of Portree. After the ceremony there will be Highland Games in sight of Skye's magnificent hills - the Black Cuillin, renowned for their beauty and for their gruelling rock climbs.

A "fill" will be opened by Lady Hermione Cameron of Lochiel and there is to be a MacLeod Day at Dunvegan Castle when Flora of MacLeod will welcome all her guests, Shinty matches, sheep dog trials, cruises and tours will highlight the week's events.

Visitors arriving on the island on Friday, May 19, will be welcomed by pipe music at Portree and a concert at Broadford.

The official welcoming ceremony to be held at the games ground at Portree on Saturday, May 20, will be attended by Lord Lieutenant of the County, Sir Donald Cameron of Lochiel, K. T.; Sir Andrew Murray, Lord Provost of Edinburgh; Mr. Victor Warren, the Lord Provost of Glasgow; Mr. Thomas Johnston, the chairman of the Scottish Tourist Board; Lord and Lady MacLeod; Flora of MacLeod; and Provost Grigor of Inverness.

Grain

WINNIPEG, May 3. - (CP) - Reaction in United States markets brought out selling in all grains on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today. Commercial demand in oats and barley was limited and prices registered a decline.

Trading was fairly active. Rye futures had some American demand and took on a steady tone. In export business, the United Kingdom was allocated 700,000 bushels of wheat under the Anglo-Canadian wheat agreement. Belgium bought 265,000 bushels; Colombia 170,000 bushels; Switzerland 20,000; and Brazil took a small portion.

Class two wheat, for export to countries other than the United Kingdom, was down one cent. Closing quotations:
