FISHERY LICENSES.—The Dominion Government has been in the habit of granting licenses to fish in the rivers of the several provinces. But, if Judge Fisher be right, that Government transcends its power in doing so. His decision is that the Federal Government has no power to grant licenses to fish in rivers beyond the point where the tide rises; that the right of fishery is incident to the ownership of the land, and belongs to the Local Governments, or to private owners, as the case may be. No doubt the question will go to the Supreme Court or the Privy Council for final adjudication.—*Monetary Times*.
