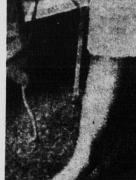

IN RECENT years, barley has been made available for quicker cooking. It contains as much as 12 per cent protein and deserves to be used more often.

For example, prepare it according to package directions, but use only half of the cooking time, add 1/2 cup butter or margarine, stir in 1/2 cup raisins, or apricot or dried prunes, or dried figs. Cover and finish cooking.

One of my favorites is barley baked with roast lamb. It's quick, remarked the Chef. "Peanut-butter, stir in 1/2 cup butter or margarine and 1/2 cup poultry seasoning. Shape into balls with an ice cream scoop first dipped in hot-water. Then there's your new chicken barley soup."

Measurements level CHICKEN-BARLEY SOUP VEGETABLE SOUP One 1/2-lb stewing chicken, cut up 1/2 cup regular pearled barley, uncooked 1 qt. water 1 bay leaf 1 tsp salt 2 cups peppercorns 1 cup sliced carrots 2 cups chopped celery 1/2 cup chopped peeled onion 1 cup frozen (and defrosted) peas 1/2 cup fine-chopped parsley 1/2 place chicken, barley, bay leaf, water, salt and peppercorns in large kettle. Cover, boil slowly for 2 hrs. or until chicken is tender.

Add carrots, celery and onion; cook 45 minutes. Remove bay leaf and chicken. Cut chicken meat from bones and dice. Add to soup with peas and parsley; simmer 10 minutes. Serve hot. Makes 4 qts.—equal to two meals.

To Freeze: Ladle into varnished-zinc freezing containers. Leave at least 1 in. space at top for expansion during freezing. It keeps in freezer about 1 month. Reheat in covered saucepan.

Curried Chicken-Barley Vegetable Soup: Add 1/2 tsp curry powder to each pint of from soup when reheating. Do not add curry powder before freezing. It sometimes develops musty taste can kill any moths which may be present when picked up.
