Wireless Telegraphy in England.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Daily Mail this morning makes the following announcement:

"The post departmental commission which has been inquiring into the subject will shortly report, after some months of deliberation, in favor of the earliest possible adoption of Marconi's system of wireless telegraphy by the postal authorities.

"The commission is also arranging as to terms for the acquisition of the Marconi patents and negotiating with France and Germany regarding their attitude towards Marconi's invention.

"This evidently means a complete revolution in the telegraphic system."

German Precautions,

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—It has leaked out that the forthcoming imperial budget will provide for two new pioneer battalions of three companies for each army corps. It will also provide 3,500,000 marks for building a war harbor at Dantzie. At Kiel, a large anchorage and harbor for warships will be built, together with a harbor for torpedo boats, capable of holding sixty of the largest. At Wilhelmshaven two immense dry docks will be built.

Snow in Virginia.

ROANOAKE, Va., Nov. 9.—The mercury took a sudden tumble yesterday. Snow fell last evening for the first time this winter. The Allegheny mountains hereabouts are covered tonight.
