

# See Possibility Of Joint Canada-U.S. Command

## Georgetown and Vicinity

OTTAWA, (CP)—A joint Canadian-American command for the defence of North America is a possibility, but only if it fits into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Canadian military observers say such a command makes military sense. However, the road could be rough from a political standpoint. They do not think it is an immediate necessity, but rather an eventual and logical outgrowth of existing close liaison between United States and Canadian defence forces.

Gen. Omar Bradley, former chairman of the American joint chiefs of staff, has called for a joint continental command in a series of magazine articles. He suggested that President Eisenhower and Prime Minister St. Laurent discuss the possibility in the near future.

Meanwhile, Canadian military officials declined to comment on the article.

Qualified observers, however, said they believe the chances for a joint command boil down to this—if established strictly within the framework of NATO, it should meet only limited resistance in Canada.

If, however, it should turn out to be merely a bilateral arrangement between Washington and Ottawa, it might not be accepted. Public opinion, oftentimes sensitive to any encroachment on Canadian sovereignty, might react strongly.
