GENERAL CLEMENTS HARD
PRESSED

Loses Five Officers and Nine
Men.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Lord Kitchen reports that eighteen officers and five hundred and forty-five men are missing from General Clements force.

They consist of four companies of the Northumberland Fusiliers.

Judging from the message, they have been captured by the Boers.

General Clements' casualties on Dec. 13, were five officers and nine men killed and many wounded.

A London Paper Talks to the
United States Senate.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—"No other construction can be placed upon the action of the United States," says the Daily Chronicle, "than that the Senators have deliberately made up their minds to force England into a false position and to make a refusal to ratify the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty, from this side.

"President McKinley, as usual, shouts with the larger crowd.

"If the United States go out of their way to break their treaty with England, such conduct will come within the definition of an 'unfriendly act.'

"We are loath to think that the era of good relations with America is coming to an end. But if she were to take advantage of our complications in South Africa and China, after we had given her our aid during her complications with Spain, we could neither desire nor trust her friendship in future."

BIG STORM.

California in a Hurricane.

FARMERS MEETING AT GUELPH

Just Before the Live
Stock Exhibition.

INTERESTING TOPICS

Of Agriculture Discussed---Wo-
men in it as Well as Men.

AMINER.]

The Maritime delegation, consisting of about forty farmers, arrived at the Royal City on Monday afternoon and are mostly all billeted at the Wellington Hotel. Our friend, the genial and indefatigable Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, Mr. F. W. Hodson, met us on our arrival and had previously arranged our quarters for us.

The show of live stock opens tomorrow. The Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union held the first session of their annual meeting today. The meeting was a very interesting one and the subjects discussed of intense interest to all farmers.

The president, Mr. H. R. Ross, gave the opening address, and was followed by Mr. C. A. Zavitz, experimentalist at the A. A. C., his subject being co-operative experiments with grain and roots. This work has been carried on by a large number of farmers in different parts of the province of Ontario, and has resulted in much valuable information which will be of great benefit to agriculture.

Mr. G. C. Creelman, Superintendent of Farmer's Institutes, gave an able address on the "Farmer's Institute as an Educator." Mr. Creelman is an eloquent speaker, and in his address showed how, as a result of the excellent system of Farmer's Institutes that obtains here, the people have made great advances along agricultural lines. The idea of the Farmer's Institutes here is to make agricultural teaching to the older farmers who cannot attend the Agricultural College.

Addresses were afterwards delivered by Mr. T. C. Raynor, whom many Islanders will remember hearing with pleasure a few weeks ago in Charlottetown, and a number of other prominent Institute workers. These speakers discussed the present state of the Farmer's Institute, and suggested improvements that their experience in the work had convinced them were desirable.

At the same hour there was a large assemblage of ladies in the class room, presided over by Dr. Mills. Such subjects as "Dress, its health, influence and beauty," "Domestic Science," and "Housekeeping in the 20th century," were ably discussed, by Miss Laura Rose, Guelph; Miss B. Maddock, Guelph; and Prof. Ellen Richards, of Boston Mass.

Tonight at 8 o'clock we shall have the pleasure of hearing such men as the Hon. John Dryden, Prof. J. P. Roberts, of Cornell University, Professor F. C. Harrison, Dr. A. E. Shuttleworth, well known on the Island—Mrs E. H. Richards, Professor of Sanitary Chemistry, Boston Mass.

The speeches will be interspersed with music, including solos by such renowned musicians as Madame Diaz Albertini.

The weather is quite cold here. The maritime visitors had a very pleasant trip. Nothing occurred to mar their enjoyment.
