### News Notes.

In Winona, Wabash and Olmsted counties, Minn., the corn crop has been practically ruined by frost.

A terrific gale in North Wales has caused further great damage to crops. Prayers were said in the churches for fine weather.

The London Standard's Berlin correspondent says England has intimated her intention to increase her Mediterranean fleet largely.

The Spanish Premier has called a Ministerial Council to discuss the agitation against the reciprocity treaty with the United States.

During the Chinese typhoon of August 18, the British gunboat Tweed broke her moorings and was dashed against the wall of the naval yard at Kowloon and sunk.

It is reported from Winnipeg that the Northern Pacific Railway Company intends to build a line to Selkirk to accommodate the fish and lumber trade of Lake Winnipeg.

The British Board of Trade has issued an urgent warning to intending emigrants to beware of Brazil, as the British who have already gone there are reported to be destitute.

The Sultan has determined to take energetic steps to suppress brigandage, and with that end in view he dismissed his Vizier, who was lax in his administration of affairs.

At the Trades Union congress at Newcastle there are 500 delegates present, representing 1,500,000 British workmen, skilled and unskilled. The congress will discuss a number of questions of importance to the working classes.

The repeal of the German regulations against American hog products has strongly affected the Liverpool provision market. Leading merchants are reluctant to sell pending an expected rise. The hope is expressed that France will remove her restrictions on American pork.

A detailed account of the horrors at the Weston insane asylum in West Virginia have been made public. Suicides have occurred from time to time, it is alleged, among the inmates, and they all have been attended by the most horrible circumstances. Men killed themselves by boiling to death and suspension by ropes from windows. All this was done in sight of the guards and no investigation was made.

The project of Australian confederation has encountered a rebuff in the return by New South Wales, the senior Antipodean colony, of a parliamentary majority opposed to federation in any form; and in the refusal, which is also announced, of New Zealand to become a member of the proposed commonwealth. Opposition to the project in both colonies comes mainly, it appears, from the workingmen, whose objection to it has its ground and origin in a fear that confederation would involve the support of the poorer colonies by those that are more prosperous, and that the latter would be called upon to shoulder the debts of the former.

It is satisfactory to note that visitors from Great Britain having once seen Canada like to come back. Lord and Lady Aberdeen, whose residence in Canada last year seems to have pleased them with the country, are returning for another visit. The earl and his family arrived at New York on Wednesday, and intend going via Montreal to British Columbia to inspect a property which he purchased there. Lady Aberdeen, who is interested in promoting the industry of Irish lace-making, intends to make arrangements for an exhibit of Irish textile products at the Chicago exposition.
