

# Eskimos Crack Records In 34-19 Grey Cup Victory

VANCOUVER (CP)—Edmonton Eskimos spilled Grey Cup records all over Empire Stadium Saturday in a sensational ground attack that upset Montreal Alouettes 34-19 before a howling crowd of 39,417.

The crowd itself was a record for the 47-year history of Grey Cup play and the second straight victory by the west coast team in the national classic. The Alouettes were victims of quarter Jackie Parker, the outstanding player on the field, and the big gold and green club from Edmonton both times.

Despite the brilliant passing of Sam Etcheverry of the Alouettes who completed an almost-unbelievable 30 of 36 passes, another record, the Eskimos convincingly proved that the ground attack was the most potent weapon—at least on Saturday. Eskimos drove 440 yards overland, 64 more than the previous high of 376 set by Hamilton Tigers in 1932.

**ALS LEAD AT HALF**

It was the first time the cup final had been played in the west since Earl Grey donated the trophy back in 1909 and the game itself was the climax to the most riotous and colorful spectacle in the west and wonderful story of the cup.

It had everything a fan would want and the predominantly western crowd was in high glee as the Eskimos tore through the Alouette line time and again and Edmonton's hard-charging front wall proved the Montreal backfield to haunt Etcheverry.

The Alouettes appeared all set to avenge their 26-25 beating in 1954 although they led only 19-18 after the first half. They were the highest scoring second-half club of the east but the Eskimos stole the script and didn't give up a point while powering for two converted touchdowns, a field goal and a single.

Normie Kwong and Johnny

Bright each scored two Edmonton touchdowns. Bob Heydenfeldt added another on a pass when Parker gambled on third down with three yards to go, from the Montreal 15. Sure-footed Bob Dean kicked five converts, a field goal and a single.

For Montreal Hal Patterson caught two touchdowns passes from Etcheverry and Pat Abbruzzi, voted Canada's outstanding player for 1955 earlier in the week—although he couldn't make much of a dent in the Eskimo line throughout the afternoon—bulled over from the one-yard line. Bud Korchak kicked the converts and added a single.

**ESKS START ROUT**

Fumbles led directly to one touchdown by each team. The Alouettes scoring on a pass to Patterson from the Edmonton 41-yard line in the first quarter and the Eskimos on a series of ground plays from their 36 in the second quarter.

The revenge-seeking Alouettes, out to prove that last year's loss to the Eskimos was a fluke, jumped into a 13-6 first-quarter lead, striking for touchdowns of 47 and 69 yards on the pin-point passing of Etcheverry. The Eskimos outscored the Alouettes two touchdowns in the second quarter and that was the start of the rout, although few in the stands believed the westerners' ground attack could overcome Montreal's aerial barrage.

Eskimos whaled away at the red and white line almost from the start of the third quarter and it soon became evident that history was in the making. Kwong went over from the one-yard line after his second touchdown after runs by Parker and Earl Lindley to put Edmonton in front to stay.

The Canadian-born half scored at 5:40 and exactly seven minutes later Bright scored the final touchdown. The Eskimos staved from their own 16 and, with Bright,

Lindley, Kwong and Parker carrying the ball, got to the Montreal one in 10 plays. Bright barged over from there.

Dean finished the scoring with a single and a field goal in the final quarter.

**RECORDS FALL**

Two records were set before the teams went on the field. The crowd of 39,417 eclipsed the previous record of 27,391 set in 1952 at Toronto Varsity Stadium. The gate receipts Saturday were approximately \$228,000, far ahead of the old mark of \$126,940 set in 1953 at Toronto.

On Etcheverry's passing the Alouettes picked up 508 yards, far ahead of the Montreal quarter's own record set last year, 398 yards. His pass completions—30 of 39 for an average of 77 per cent, also beat his 1954 average of 69 per cent.

There were eight converts by both teams. The previous high was seven, made last year when Montreal had four converts and Edmonton three.

The lowest number of punts was also recorded, each team kicking six times. The previous low was 13, by the same two teams last year when Edmonton kicked 10 times and Montreal three.

## Rollins Scores Shutout As Hawks Blast Bruins

BOSTON (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks handed the slumping Boston Bruins their seventh shutout of the season and third in four games with a 6-0 National Hockey League victory Sunday night at Boston Gardens.

Chicago goalie Al Rollins registered his third shutout of the year as the Bruins' winless streak was extended to eight games. Over that stretch the Bruins have managed to score

only five goals.

Rookie winger Hec Lalande led the Chicago assault against the frustrated Boston club with two goals and two assists. The other Hawk marksmen were Johnny Wilson, Nick Mickoski, Hank Ciesla and Fred Sullivan.

The Hawks took a 1-0 lead in the opening period, on Wilson's tally and then added three more in the middle session, although outshut by the Bruins, 17-10. Many of Rollins' saves in the period were of the sensational variety.

Sullivan—back in action after being sidelined with a severely gashed leg—and Lalande wound up the scoring in the final period as the crowd of 8,021 boomed the Boston performance.

## Riot Follows Soccer Game

RANGOON, (AP)—More than 5,000 persons rioted through Rangoon for eight hours after a soccer game Saturday, smashing windows, ripping down traffic signs and tearing up paving stones.

The trouble started in Rangoon's Sports Stadium, where some of the 20,000-strong crowd swarmed on to the pitch after the final whistle to see President Ba U present prizes to the winning team. Mounted police spurred their horses across to hold back the crowd and in the melee a 12-year-old boy was injured.

This incensed the crowd. They stoned the police, uprooted seats and railings, and set the stadium gates on fire. A group of 150 policemen, a magistrate and stadium officials were besieged in the main buildings as the mob joined by thousands more outside, roamed through the city attacking police and fire brigade personnel.

It was well past midnight before the army stepped in and dispersed the mob—but not until police were forced to release 10 people arrested during the rioting.

## \$75,000 Race Ends In Tie

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Times Square won the third leg of the \$75,000 American racing classic Saturday, throwing the pacifying event into a tie between the winner and Hillsdale, which finishing third, Diamond Hal, finishing fifth, settled for third money over all.

Philip Scott was second in Saturday's race. Time for the race was 1:56 on a fast track.

Diamond Hal, the favorite, seemed a cinch to win his second straight in this three day classic. The Shafter Ranch star handled by Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. L., had won last week in 1:57.4 by three lengths.
