The public examination of this school today was attended by His Worship the Mayor, Hon. D. Laird, Dr. Anderson, Rev James Simpson, Archibald Kennedy, Esq., Dr. Taylor and Mrs. Taylor, Miss Fennessy, Mr. T. C. James, Mr. J. K. Ross, Mrs. Sullivan and Misses Sullivan, Mrs. Lord, Mrs. L. H. Davies, Mr. Duchemin and many other persons. Examinations were conducted by the Mayor, Dr. Anderson, T. C. James, J. K. Ross, Mr. Howlett, Miss Fennessy and others, with very satisfactory results. Afterwards there was an entertainment in the upper hall, the following programme being very well received:

Mr. Laird said that in his opinion the educational work done at West Kent Street School was of a very substantial character. Mr. Laird enlarged upon the advantages of a good education. Archibald Kennedy, Esq., who presided, announced that it was found to be necessary either to enlarge West Kent and Upper Prince school houses, or to build an additional school house. He dismissed the school until the 28th day of August next.

CONVENT DE NOTRE DAME.

Last Days of the Scholastic Year.

A Golden Anniversary. The commencement exercises of the Convent de Notre Dame were distinguished by an altogether unexpected and unique feature. The visitors included Judge Reddin and Mrs. Reddin and the Misses Roddin, Mrs. and Miss Sullivan, the Superintendant of Education and Mrs. MacLeod, Dr. Anderson and Mrs. Anderson, Professor Cameron, Dr. Conroy and Mrs. Conroy, Mr. P. G. Gillis and Mrs. Gillis, Dr. Cunningham, of Macdonald, John A. McDonald, Esq., Joseph A. Macdonald and several others of the laity, together with a large representation of the Roman Catholic clergy of the diocese headed by Monsignor Macleod, who occupied the chair. The room was tastefully decorated. Among the mottoes on the walls were conspicuous the words "June, 1842," "June, 1892," the meaning of which was explained in the course of the event. We regret that space is not afforded the EXAMINER to-day for a description of the entertainment. The central point of interest in the programme was "A Mystery and its Solution." The secret was out, however, when it appeared in the course of the review of his life, which the young ladies declaimed, that the entertainment was in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of the admission to the priesthood of the Very Rev. Monsignor Macleod. This tribute, was poetic and artistic in conception, was beautifully (shall we say perfectly?) rendered by the children and young ladies of the school, whose clear enunciation and excellent manner were admirable. The music, too, with piano, violin, harp, and the sweet voices of the girls, was excellent. Monsignor Macleod expressed, in the course of a brief and eloquent speech, his heartfelt thanks for the beautiful memento, for which he was quite unprepared. The Rev. R. Macleod said that he had been delighted with the entertainment, which was, indeed, a well-merited tribute to Monsignor Macleod. He added that it was Father James who had made a Christian of him—upon which it was remarked that the Rev. Donald's was a very fine specimen of the Monsignor's workmanship! Dr. Anderson complimented the school upon the excellence of the entertainment, and the good and lady-like conduct of the girls from the Convent schools. He also bore testimony to the solid attainments of some of these girls as evidenced by the high position they obtained in competitions at the Prince of Wales College and Normal School of the Superintendent of Education spoke of the "admirable work" of the girls whom he had examined in mathematics and said that he had frequently noticed that they were particularly good readers.

The Golden Legend.

To those who have never read Longfellow's "Golden Legend," and who intend to patronize the Philharmonic Society Concert this evening, a short explanation of the scenes chosen by the musical composer for his Cantata may not be unacceptable. The old scene represents Lucifer in a storm of thunder and lightning encouraging the spirits of the air to pull down the cross from the spire of Strasburg Cathedral. The spirits declare that they are overpowered by legions of Saints and Angels, and cannot effect their purpose. Lucifer next directs their efforts against the bells, but his subjects tell him that the bells have been blessed, and are beyond their power. Next the lightning is ordered to be aimed at the iron-studded doors. But the same answer comes, the doors are too well guarded by apostles and martyrs. Finally the spirits are ordered to desert, and they fly off not much dejected by failure and defeat, if one may judge by the songs they sing as they leave. Then from out the Cathedral is heard the solemn music of the choir in apt contrast with that which has just died away. It should be mentioned that during the attack on the Cathedral a chorus of male voices sing the old legend as usually recited on church bells. Thus the audience hears the angry orders of Lucifer, the somewhat apologetic replies of his ministers, and the solemn expostulations of the bells to form a combination of the most dramatic character.

The second scene introduces the heroic Prince Henry of Heeneck, who, in his exalted mental, details his misdeeds, "physical and mental," and wishes for death. Lucifer, in the garb of a travelling physician, suddenly presents himself, tells what the Prince's illness is, ridicules the remedies proposed by a doctor of his own compounding, and gives him a draught of his own concoction. The effects of this draught are represented in a piece of exquisite workmanship by the musician. The wild ecstasy of the Prince, the horrified mutterings of the invisible chorus of angels, and Lucifer's dreadful revelations of the effects his draught will work, are music to stand out and not blend in a manner in Longfellow's finest vein, and truthfully re-echoed by the music.

The Prince and Elsie, with their attendants, arrive at Salerno. Here Lucifer again interposes. Elsie is determined to die. The prince presents her as mad. She is carried off by Lucifer, and the prince and attendants make a wild rush to rescue her. To this scene of passion succeeds one of calm repose. The prince has been cured by means less desperate than a human's efforts, and in gratitude to the unknown Saviour, he has made his prayers. "They call her the Lady Alicia now."

Very Rev. James McDonald was born in St. Andrew's, King's County, Prince Edward Island, on the 19th of May, 1819. His father was Donald McDonald, of the Western Highlands of Scotland, who emigrated from Glenorchy in the brig Alexander for St. John's Island (now called P. E. Island) in 1772. His mother, Catherine McDonald, was born in South Uist in 1777.

Mr. McDonald studied for several years at St. Andrew's College, and in 1840 he entered the Grand Seminary of Quebec, where he was ordained on the 23rd June, 1842, by the late Right Rev. B. D. McDonald, Bishop of Charlottetown. He was appointed Vicar General in 1855 and Monsignor in 1887.

The following parishes have been served by him since 1842: St. Mary's, Indian River; Saints Peter and Paul, Summerside; St. Peter's, Seven Mile Bay; St. Patrick's, Grand River West; St. Ann's, Lennox Island; and numerous outside stations.

In 1869 he took charge of St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, of which he was the pastor in the year 1880, to undertake the parishes of St. Andrew's, St. Patrick's and St. Lawrence, Montreal, of which parishes he now has charge.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

New Brunswick and P. E. Island.

TUESDAY, June 28th. FORENOON SESSION. Dr. Carmen in the chair. After singing prayer was offered by Rev. W. Lodge and C. A. Smith, Esq. The consideration of the SUPERNUMERARY FUND. The P. E. I. and St. Stephen Districts were reported to have paid their full assessment of ten cents per member. Rev. E. Evans, Secretary-Treasurer, then presented the Treasurer's report. The income had been as follows: Nova Scotia.....\$1,824 66 N. B. and P. E. B. and P. E. I.....4,397 50 Newfoundland.....1,010 00 Other Conferences.....190 50 Total.....\$11,315 00 This was equal to only 72 per cent of the claims. This year the supernumeraries have been settled at the rate of 87 per cent of their claims, and it is hoped that an addition may be made to this amount. Revs. D. Chapman, George Steel and John Reid asked questions or offered assurances that the secretary-treasurer had the hearty support of the conference in his work. Rev. J. R. Bell was appointed to prepare a suitable minute regarding this matter. The capital stock of the fund is about \$51,000. The amount of interest is decreasing as compared with former years, money being obtainable at an easier rate than formerly.

CHILDREN'S FUND.

This fund was brought up before the Conference by memorials and resolutions from the district, one district supplying the fund, while another recommends a change. Rev. A. C. Bell, B. A., introduced a resolution, asking for a considerable modification of the constitution of the fund. He explained that the object of his resolution was to raise the salary of every minister up to \$750. After that his claims are to cease. His speech was enlivened by several sallies of humor from himself and others. He spoke as considerable length. His resolution was considered by Rev. J. Shenton, who explained that he was in favor of some readjustment. Rev. J. Seller opposed any change in the working of the fund. Rev. Silas James spoke in favor of the fund. Rev. C. H. Paisley, A. M., claimed for the right of a full discussion of this fund. He spoke in favor of the existing state of things. Rev. S. H. Rice pleaded in favor of the fund as it now exists. Rev. J. F. Estey moved an amendment which was seconded by Rev. G. Steel. The purpose of the amendment was to lower the rate of claims for certain classes of ministers.

On motion, the debate was adjourned till the afternoon session. Benediction by Dr. Carmen.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

New Brunswick and P. E. Island.

TUESDAY, June 28th. FORENOON SESSION. Dr. Carmen in the chair. After singing prayer was offered by Rev. W. Lodge and C. A. Smith, Esq. The consideration of the SUPERNUMERARY FUND. The P. E. I. and St. Stephen Districts were reported to have paid their full assessment of ten cents per member. Rev. E. Evans, Secretary-Treasurer, then presented the Treasurer's report. The income had been as follows: Nova Scotia.....\$1,824 66 N. B. and P. E. This year the supernumeraries have been settled at the rate of 87 per cent of their claims, and it is hoped that an addition may be made to this amount. Revs. D. Chapman, George Steel and John Reid asked questions or offered assurances that the secretary-treasurer had the hearty support of the conference in his work. Rev. J. R.
