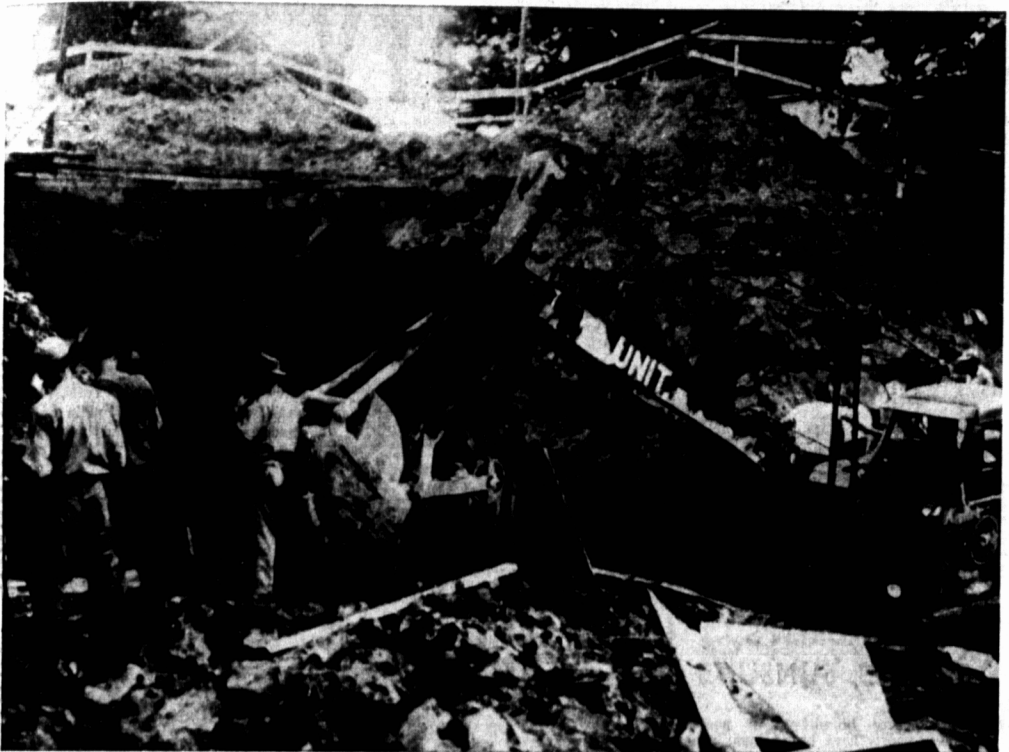

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR FARMING

Chinchilla fur farming must be assuming considerable proportions in the United States, as we notice an ad in Women's Wear Daily as follows: 'Just put up — 1,500 chinchilla pelts, matched bundles, various qualities, on sale by private treaty — New York Auction Company, West 6th Street, New York. Mink was given strong play in window dressings in the annual fur fashion openings at Denver, Colorado. One of the leading specialty stores managers said: 'We have more to talk about this year and it will help the fur business. Mink will still be the fur that most people will buy, but this year other furs will be interesting to customers also.'

Concentration in most ads was on mink. The Denver Dry Goods Company advertised a pre-season fur sale of mink at \$388, \$488, and \$588. The May Company advertised mink stoles and capes at \$300, \$400 and \$500, with a special group of five natural mink stoles and clutch capes at \$200. Dupier's advertised their 53th annual mid-summer mink 'miracle' — featuring mink coats — full length pastel at \$2,257, sapphire mink stoles at \$487, and sapphire cabachon stoles at \$897. Barrie's Fur's advertised broad-tail processed lamb, trimmed with sapphire mink at \$490 and a full-length couturier coat in gun-metal mink at \$2,590, and a white fox clutch cape at \$350.

The above is just an illustration of the ads that are appearing all over the United States and will be later appearing in Canada, featuring mink and other furs. It is this general use of printer's ink that makes the ladies desire the beautiful and very desirable fur accessories mentioned, as part of the lady of fashion's wardrobe.

A despatch from Montreal states that the impressive lists of 19 retail fur men from Montreal and Toronto has been lined up by the Fur Trade Association of Canada Inc. to form a two-market selection committee for its 'Canada Pageant of Fur Fashions' presentation which starts on its Trans-Canada tour

from Halifax early next month. The Halifax Fur Guild Association, representing six retail fur stores in that city, has the sale of tickets well in hand for the inaugural of this fur collection of some 60 garments, which is to be shown in major cities across the country. Confirmation has been given on plans to hold this Halifax premiere aboard the Canadian aircraft carrier 'Bonaventure' in Halifax harbour on September 6 and 7. Permission has been given to stage this show on the carrier's flight deck by way of sendoff to a collection which is being promoted as: 'A show window across Canada for the industry's best efforts.'

Ronald Mitchell Fur Company, who is vice-president of the Halifax association, says they expected that some 35 retail furriers who operate fur stores in four Atlantic provinces — Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland — will be in Halifax for the occasion.

CROSS CANADA Mayor Leonard Kitz is lending his support by staging a garden reception at his home on September 6 to welcome visiting furriers and show personnel as part of the promotion. After leaving Halifax, the show will move to Quebec City on September 10, where it will be held in the Coliseum, thence it will move to Ottawa, out west to Winnipeg, Regina, Vancouver, and so on. Then back to eastern cities like Toronto, Montreal and maybe elsewhere. The coats and other furs, and show personnel, will journey by air from city to city, with local furriers being readied to welcome them on arrival. A glance of the stores and establishments that are behind this new exhibition of furs shows the top merchandisers in all the cities of Canada where the shows will be held. Our mink farmers can feel confident that as a result of these displays, the sales of mink furs will be appreciably increased, and as these sales increase, so will the mink industry prosper and the ranchers obtain more

Hit-And-Run Driver Fined

A hit-and-run driver from Summerside who sideswiped a car from Dartmouth on Thursday night about 8:30 at Summerside East, was apprehended about ten minutes later in Kensington by the R.C.M.P. He was fined \$100 and costs yesterday morning when he appeared before Magistrate R.S. Hinton in Summerside.

The offending driver, in a 1954 Dodge coach, was proceeding East on the main highway just east of Summerside, and the Nova Scotia vehicle, a 1955 Meteor coach, was travelling towards Summerside. Both cars were extensively damaged but the occupants were unhurt.

Two Canadian Soldiers Face Narcotics Trial

OTTAWA (CP) — Two Canadian lance corporals will be tried by Canadian army court martial in Egypt later this month on charges laid under the Opium and Narcotics Act of Canada, army headquarters said Thursday.

The two men, serving with the Canadian contingent of the United Nations Emergency Force, are L. Cpl. James E. Hatt of Allison, Ont., and L. Cpl. Joseph C. M. Thibodeau of Green River, N.B.

They were taken into custody by Egyptian authorities last week after search of a truck they were operating. Egyptian officials said 126 pounds of opium and hashish were found in the 2½-ton truck, which was stopped at Ismailia, 60 miles south of Port Said on the Suez Canal.

TRAFFICKING CHARGED The two soldiers are charged with being in possession of narcotics for the purpose of trafficking.

Their defence, an army officer said, is they did not know of the presence of the drugs in the truck. They claim that somebody who knew of their movements in advance hid the drugs in the truck and intended to retrieve them later at Port Said.

The court martial is tentatively scheduled for Aug. 26 at Rafah, main Canadian base in the Sinai desert near the Gaza Strip. The president of the court, the prosecutor and defence counsel all will be Canadian officers.

The two soldiers have been serving with a detachment of 56 Transport Company, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps, at Port Said.

STOPPED ON BRIDGE They transported supplies from Port Said to el Qanra south of Ismailia and to pick up supplies at Ismailia on the way back to Port Said.

The investigation was conducted by two Canadians, Wing Cmdr. S. L. Howell, legal officer for the UN force, and Capt. M.P. Menard, provost marshal, who worked in co-operation with the Egyptian officials.

The charges are the first of a serious nature placed against Canadians since the contingent arrived in Egypt last fall.

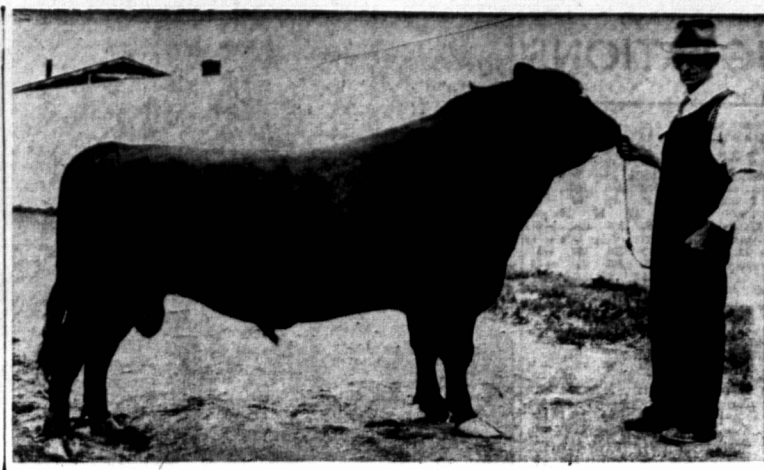

Saul Aronowicz, 57th Street retailer of New York, who died at the United States fur exhibit at the recently held International Fair in Pozan, Poland, has given an interview of which these are excerpts: 'For the first time in a long time, the United States made the most of what we had to offer. We showed things that the average woman admires and can afford. We had mobs at our fur fashion showings, and in fact the crowds had to be cut down at one point because our pavilion almost collapsed, it was so jammed.'

'The United States exhibit contained about 75 garments, with prices ranging from \$25 for suede coat to \$750 for a mink jacket. Other furs represented included Persian lamb, skunk, leopard nutria and foxes of all types. Mink was easily the most popular American fur, with leopard second and Persian lamb third. In addition to the fur collection, a dozen large photos of high-styled United States garments was shown.'

'It was amazing how excited the Polish women got looking at these photos. As for Iron Curtain fur exhibits, Mr. Aronowicz stated jokingly, 'I don't think we have anything to worry about for a while.' He described Russian exhibits as primitive. 'The Russians have no taste — all their styles are the same. There is no charm in their garments. It is all done with a heavy hand and must be rated about 50 years behind the times. On the other hand, Polish workmanship is very good.' Galicia in Poland was once the center of fur craftsmanship in Central Europe. It produced for the continent and South America, but most of its top workmen fled or lost their lives in the Nazi raids.

A despatch from Tokyo, dated August 6, states that export of mink skins to the United States for the first half of 1957 was 25 per cent below the same 1956 period. Shipments in June, according to the Finance Minister, included 25,000 mink, and various other cheap furs. Total exports of mink for the first half of 1957 were 244,000 as compared to 280,000 in the previous year.

World Postal Congress Meeting Now At Ottawa

Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — Postal experts from 96 countries get down to the hard facts of international co-operation today as the 14th congress of the Universal Postal Union swings into sessions that will last six weeks or better.

Presiding at this first Canadian meeting of the 83-year-old world postal body is Canada's deputy postmaster-general, Walter J. Turnbull, newly elected president of the congress. He was chosen at Wednesday's first sitting after an opening welcome to delegates by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

The 60-year-old Mr. Turnbull, a veteran of 42 years of government service who is due to retire this year, said in an interview following his election that the cold war has brought 'political' problems to the union.

Despite these problems he said co-operation within the union is such that mail 'flows freely to all parts of the world,' including

Staff Course For War Hero

OTTAWA (CP) — Group Capt. Leonard J. Birchall, 42, of St. Catharines, Ont., who became known as the Saviour of Ceylon during the Second World War by warning defenders of an approaching Japanese fleet, has been chosen to attend the next course at National Defence College, Kingston, Ont.

The announcement by air force headquarters Thursday said he will leave his present post as deputy military advisor to the Canadian NATO delegation in Paris, to attend the course beginning next September.

Birchall was shot down shortly after giving his warning message to Ceylon in 1942 and was captured. He spent three years in a Japanese prisoner-of-war camp before being repatriated to Canada in 1945.

Ask Provincial Parks Depts.

CORNWALL, Ont. (CP)—The Canadian Parks and Recreation Association Thursday adopted a resolution asking provincial governments to establish parks and recreation departments.

The resolution was unanimously approved by the 150 delegates who attended the association's four-day convention.

Bush Teacher Is Remembered

ATIKOKAN, Ont. (CP) — A stone monument provided by Frontier College, is to be set up in memory of Dr. Edmund Bradwin who for 59 years worked in this northern Ontario district as a teacher and educator in bush camps and mining areas.

Steeple Rock Mines is arranging to set up the cairn, which is to bear a photograph of Dr. Bradwin cut in brass and a suitable inscription.

The cairn's site, selected by the Atikokan Recreation and Parks Committee, is an area south of Don Park swimming pool.

Dr. Bradwin's efforts were confined largely to migratory workers in the camps. He was active during the construction of the Timiskaming and Northern Ontario railroad. Later he followed railway expansion from LaTouche to the prairies and the coast.

Before the First World War he built 26 log cabins for those seeking opportunity to improve. Along the railway construction he cleared ground and put up 86 tents for the same purpose.

He pursued studies at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., where he got his Ph.D. Because of his service to the camp men the University of Toronto conferred on him the Doctor of Law.

He never relinquished his purpose to have representatives from the best universities align themselves through the day as laborers and share life with men who received too little education.
