

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

MASTERS A SPECIALTY.—Beer Bros. Music in the Gardens.—The Citizens' Band will play in the Gardens this evening, weather permitting.

FARMERS are finding considerable difficulty in securing enough help to gather in this year's heavy crop of hay.

NEXT!—A stalk of Timothy, picked in the field of Mr. Allan Stewart, Southport, measuring 5 feet 4 inches, was left at our office to-day. Who will be next?

CITY COUNCIL.—A meeting of the City Council will be held this (Thursday) evening, at half-past seven, to consider what arrangements it is desirable to make on the occasion of the visit of the Governor-General.

SCOTCH GATHERING.—The Scottish Gathering will be held at Georgetown on the 11th of August, instead of on the 15th, as at first intended. It is expected that Lord and Lady Aberdeen will be present.

SHOULD BE RAISED.—Yesterday afternoon a cyclist narrowly escaped being caught under a high wire by a telephone wire that has been hanging very low across the road leading to Connolly's wharf for the last two or three days.

LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION AT SUMMERSIDE.—A Liberal-Conservative convention is being held at Summerside to-day for the purpose of selecting a candidate to represent the riding in the next Dominion election.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, James Caughlan, for being drunk and fighting, was given 40 days. Peter Brogan, for the license of a horse, was fined eight days. John Gilroy and Dennis McKenna, for being drunk and incapable, were each fined \$2 or 10 days. One dox-tag line of \$1 and costs was imposed.

HORSE STRANDED.—The Albion correspondent of the Guardian writes: Mr. James E. Birch lost a very valuable colt last Monday in a peculiar manner. In the field where the colt was pastured was a forced tree, and by some means it got its neck between the limbs, and when found it was strangled to death. It is a serious loss to Mr. Birch as he valued it at \$150.

DANGER POINTED OUT.—Prince Street ferry wharf is in a dangerous condition and should be attended to at once. The railing is badly dilapidated in several places, and in one place there is none at all. Should a person stumble on the plankway near these dangerous places there is little or nothing to keep him from falling headlong into the water. The danger is increased now that the electric lights have been replaced by oil lamps, which light up the wharf very imperfectly. Will the Government attend to this matter at once, or will they wait until an accident occurs or a valuable life is lost?

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A man named Myers, belonging to the 48, about 50 years of age, met with a serious accident yesterday afternoon. It seems that he, with some others, was coming off the Ferry wharf on a truck-wagon, when they met the hand going down to the steamer on their way to the picnic of St. Paul's Sunday School. The horse became alarmed at the sound and started to run, throwing Myers off. One of the wheels of the wagon passed over Myers' head, knocking him senseless and cutting him severely. Mr. Myers was taken into the railway road house where his injuries were attended to by Dr. Conroy, after which he was able to proceed home.

WEST RIVER FERRY.—The obliging and attentive ferryman, Mr. Arthur, with his new scow and other improved facilities on this ferry, can make the crossing from side to side of the river at McEwen's wharf within five minutes, conveying passengers and teams to and from Charlottetown. One of the most pleasant drives to the country can be enjoyed by crossing to Rocky Point in the morning in the steamer Southport, and taking the South Shore or West River road, a distance of some six or seven miles, to McEwen's wharf, where Mr. McArthur will be found always on hand with his new scow to ferry teams and passengers across at any hour, day or night, to McEwen's wharf—then taking a good level road to Charlottetown on return, making in all a distance of about 17 or 20 miles through a picturesque scenery of lovely country.

WEDDING AT MONTAGUE.—A highly interesting and impressive ceremony took place in the 18th inst. in the beautiful parish church at Montague, when Dr. R. J. Macdonald, of St. Peter's, was united in marriage to Miss Marie Josephine, eldest daughter of A. C. Macdonald, Esq., M. P. The ceremony was performed by Rev. R. J. Gillis, assisted by Rev. W. Phelan, P. P., and D. F. Morrison, Esq. The groom was supported by his cousin, Mr. James A. Macdonald, and the bride was attended by her three sisters. The many presents of which the bride was the recipient showed her popularity. A reception was held at the residence of the bride's parents from 3 to 6 p. m., to which the friends of the happy couple were invited. They then drove to their future home followed by the good wishes of their friends.

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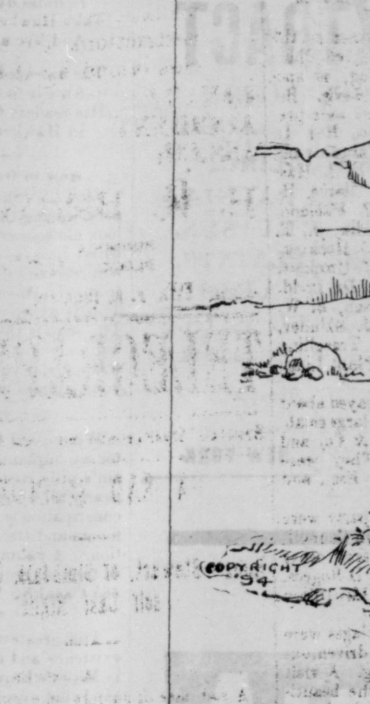
