# Consider Several Taxation Formulas

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government is considering several formulas for resolving its taxation differences with Quebec, officials said Friday.

None of the proposals has been settled on as the one that will be placed before Premier Duplessis, they said.

Authorities were asked about a report that Prime Minister St. Laurent has suggested a formula on these terms:

1. A ceiling on provincial revenues from direct taxation.
  2. Allowing individuals to deduct in full from their federal liability the amount of personal income tax they pay to a province.
- "While not fully accurate, that's a reasonable facsimile of one of the various formulas under study," said one informant.
- Chief issue over Quebec's new personal income tax is the deductibility question.
- The tax averages about 15 per cent of the federal income tax. Quebec would like to have it fully deductible. Parliament now allows deductions up to five per cent of the federal tax.

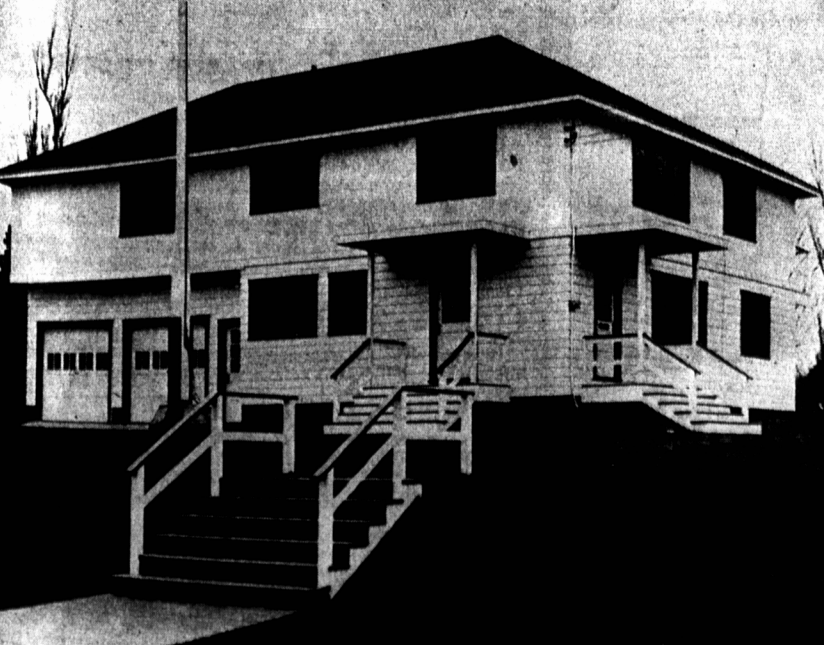

TORONTO, (CP)—Chuck Hunsinger, the man who may go down in Grey Cup history as the goat of the sensational 1954 game, was the picture of dejection in Montreal Alouettes' dressing room after the 26-25 setback at the hands of Edmonton Eskimos.

"It was just one of those things; there's no use trying to talk about it," said the former Chicago Bear.

The "it" he couldn't explain was an attempt to lateral on his own 25-yard line. The ball was gobbled up by Edmonton's Jackie Parker who raced 88 yards for the touchdown that sent the Edmonton fans into a delirium of joy.

Als coach Douglas (Peahead) Walker was disappointed over the outcome and made no bones about it.

"No, I can't say I'm surprised, though," he said. "I expected a close game. We never had much of a lead. I'm disappointed but it was a great ball game."

"We had a good team and so did Edmonton but they got the break at the end. We didn't."

Someone asked Walker if he thought breaks or football skill decided the game.

"You saw it, didn't you?" he asked.
