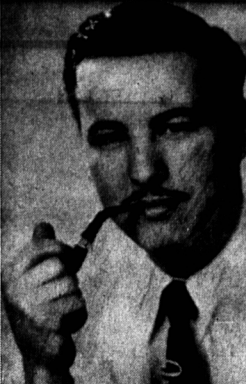

Strawberry growers and potential growers of strawberries should note that with the advent of the new frozen food plant at Sherwood a greatly increased amount of this fruit will be needed for next year. If they are to enjoy the benefit of this close at hand market, they

must secure their plants now.

In British Columbia this year, the strawberry crop is less than 20 per cent of normal with the result that the Western Province will this year have to import berries for local consumption. In Ontario and Quebec, many of the best strawberry growing areas have been taken over by housing projects. This means that the market for this year at least should be very firm.

The meeting decided that dates for the show would be July 18th to 21st and Mr. Cannon outlined the various activities which might be held in connection with it. He suggested that a sea queen beauty contest be held, float parade, athletic and swimming events, street dancing, fisheries exhibit, evening stage show, horse racing and other events which would be of interest, not only to the people of this province but to the tourists as well.

Although it was agreed that the project meant a great deal of work and periodic meetings of the committees which will function will be held from time to time to iron out the difficulties.

Plans for the proposed lobster carnival in Summerside began to take shape last evening at a meeting held in the Summerside High School library attended by representatives of the various service clubs, business men and the R.C.A.F. Station.

The plan was originally proposed by the Board of Trade and Mr. Edgar Cannon was appointed as chairman to go into the details

of the matter and investigate its possibilities. Acting as chairman of last night's meeting, Mr. Cannon said that he had gone to Shediac where he had obtained considerable information on how they stage their carnival.
