Contract Bridge

GETTING DOWN TO THE LOW CARDS:
A lowly six-spot was the key-card in the following deal:
East dealer East-West vulnerable.
AKK5
A1083
K72
KJ6
Q1097
N
W
E
S
A Q J 8

The bidding was anything but ordinary—namely:
West South West North
1♣ Pass (1) 1♠ Pass (1)
2♥ Pass 3NT
Pass 4♥ Pass Pass
Dble. Pass Pass Redble.
Pass Pass Pass
West opened his top diamond and East won with the jack. Then, knowing that declarer still had at least ten diamonds, East cashed the ace and led a third round.
Declarer gave due thought to his play at this point. He could of course ruff high draw trumps, and lead his singleton club, putting in the jack in the hope of forcing the ace from East, but South felt that East had both the ace and queen of clubs. Also, there was a chance, however slight, that West had held three diamonds and could not ruff this trick. So declarer threw off his singleton club.
West of course ruffed and his natural return was the ten of clubs. Dummy's jack forced East's queen, and South ruffed. Declarer now entered dummy with a trump and carefully led the club king through East, who of course covered to prevent a discard. Now South simply ran off every trump—and hoped!
His hope was realized. West, unfortunately for his side, had the nine and eight of clubs, and also had the spade stopper. When South cashed the last trump, West had this unpleasant choice: he could reduce to two spades, letting declarer cash all three of dummy's spades, or West could give up his last club and watch dummy's club six take the fulfilling trick!
South did a good job by "transferring" the high club from the East to the West hand, since it was only West who could be squeezed, but it is worth noting that the contract could have been beaten, simply by East's returning a spade at the second trick, and another spade at his next opportunity.
