There are two measures introduced by the Government for which we are willing to give them due credit: the first is the alteration of the mail route from Pictou to Tatnagosa. This will bring us one whole day nearer to Halifax. If matters are managed discreetly a person may leave Charlottetown, say at six or seven in the morning, and be in Halifax at night, the same journey may be accomplished in the same time from Halifax to Charlottetown as it takes to go from Pictou to Tatnagosa. This will be an immense gain in every town. This will be the same for business men of the west. Those whom business may lead to visit the main land will meet with none of those tedious delays which have hitherto attended the journey. It will be as if a place of resort and thus make it better known and, as a certain consequence, better appreciated.

The other measure, the laying out a new line of road from Charlottetown to Huslem's, where by those tedious long bills will be avoided, and the journey shortened in time if not in length, accompanied by a diminution of labor, will be attended with many beneficial consequences. The measure, which is one of the entrance ports of the Island will be thus brought much nearer to Charlottetown. Both these measures when carried into effect will greatly facilitate trade and commerce, and be the means of further developing the resources of the Island.

NEW BRUNSWICK RAILWAY.

We are gratified in being able to inform our readers, that the Government of New Brunswick have submitted a plan to the Legislature of that Province for the complete carrying on of the Railway project, and that Bills for effectuating the same have been read a first time in the House of Assembly.

We congratulate the farmers and traders of the Island on the prospect of the railway from Shediac to the Bend, being finished in the course of this season as opening a more extensive and easy mode of producing of those parts of the Island market for the produce of the opposite shore. We do not doubt that a daily steamer will be put in play, between Summerside and Shediac as soon as the railroad is finished.

The St. John Courier gives us the following information on the subject:

The delay in submitting the documents to the House is now fully explained. The Attorney General only received the Bill from England a week or two since, and that time was necessarily occupied in preparing to meet the House. Immediately after, the no-confidence motion was made, and continued the full till the end of all parties for a fortnight. Then the whole subject came before the Government, and the difficult task of settling details, so as to meet local and sectional interests, had to be overcome. We have examined the Bills with some care and feel bound to say, that we think on the whole the scheme propounded is one that will give satisfaction to the country, and if prudently managed will certainly manage to secure us a cheap and efficient Railway system.

It will be observed, that the line from the Bend to Shediac is to be first finished, and that the line from the Bend, which will run from St. John to the Bend, which is the sum allotted for it, namely, £700,000 sterling, will be completed within four years. In the meantime, and during its construction, the sum of £30,000 sterling is to be expended on each of the extensions from Shediac to Miramichi, and from Saint John to Woodstock, with the

provision, that the future expenditure on these lines shall be equal. This sum of £100,000 will go far towards grading the roads named, which may all be done with the surplus labour of the country, and will leave them ready for the rails when better times come, and money may be more easily procured. There are several minor details in the Bills, which we think might be amended with advantage, but these we do not wish to attend to, in the progress of the Bills through Committee. Should any factious opposition be made to the principles of these measures, we should think the Government could have no better question to go to the country upon, as we are satisfied, that no scheme could be devised better calculated to give general satisfaction or more likely to carry a majority in the House or the country.

We have been requested to publish a notice of a deprivation which waited upon Lord Palmerston, headed by the venerable Prime of England and comprising gentlemen representing all the various sections of the Protestant Church, as a pleasing evidence of the vital union really existing on the great question of Sabbath observance.

WESTMINSTER BANK.
