Potato Problems Discussed At Island Producers' Meeting

The importance of treating potatoes used for seed was emphasized at a potato producers' meeting held at Birch Court yesterday afternoon. Representative growers were present from many parts of the Province. Mr. Life Howatt, New Wiltshire presided. Mr. Henry MacLaren chief of the Seed Certification Branch outlined the precautions taken by his office to prevent the spread of disease and explained the regulations pertaining to the certification of seed. Mr. George Ayres, associate plant pathologist from the Science Service Laboratory said the man who treats his seed every year will very seldom have a problem with disease. He said three of the most commonly known diseases in Island potatoes are storage rot, blackleg and wilt. Mr. Ayres explained in detail the method of treatment for the prevention of these diseases. He said most of these could be traced to spores on the seed and even a good washing would benefit them materially. **EARLY PROBLEMS** Mr. S.G. Peppin, former chief inspector for the island strongly emphasized the need for seed treatment. He recalled many of the problems which faced the potato industry in the early years of its history and described the steps taken by the Department at that time. Mr. Howatt said he felt that potato producers on the island should be concerned enough with the future of the industry to make a small contribution which would provide control. At his suggestion an application form was presented asking that those present fill it in, indicating that they would be willing to pay one dollar membership fee. The application intimated that the dollar could be collected through the dealer during the shipping season. Mr. Elric Campbell, manager of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board noted that the Board had
