

Acadians Hold Spectacular Celebrations At Miscouche

The largest and most spectacular of the Acadian bicentennial celebrations was witnessed yesterday at Miscouche by hundreds of people who were present throughout or for part of the day-long program which featured the crowning of an Acadian queen at 10 a.m. followed by Solemn High Mass at 10:30.

In the afternoon a most colorful parade of floats, concluded its route of procession in the yard of the new school which formed the focal point for addresses by various speakers, and here in one of the classrooms was one of the finest community historical displays that has ever been seen in the province.

Following the evening benediction on the hall was the setting for an exceptionally fine stage adaptation of Longfellow's poem "Evangeline" and the presentation of the Acadians, in four part harmony by a group of 25 Miscouche girls.

The observances concluded with the recitation of the Rosary and a candle-light procession to the grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes on the convent lawn.

During the day the 18 men which comprise the Miscouche band, capably provided a variety of appropriate music and were the object of much favorable comment.

This outstanding program was organized under the convener'ship of Messrs. Edward LeClair and John DesRoché.

of some 5,000 representatives from French Acadian settlements throughout the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, Maine, and the Magdalen Islands adopted the Acadian flag—the red, white, and blue tri-color with a yellow star on the blue, and the Acadian anthem "Ave Marie Stella", which are seen and heard wherever French Acadians assemble.

The program yesterday morning began with the crowning of Miss Rosalie DesRoché as queen for the day, and appointment of Misses Erma Gallant, Doreen DesCote, and Marguerite LeClair as her princesses.

The crowning ceremony was performed in the morning by Judge Sylvère DesRoché, a native of Miscouche who now resides in Montague, and brief remarks were made by Rev. Nazaire Poirier.

This ceremony was the culmination of four days of participation by local citizens in the selection of a queen and princesses.

At the evening programme the girls were presented with gifts in appreciation of their part in the observances.

A large attendance was present for Solemn High Mass in the morning with the resident priest, Rev. J. D. Kelly, as celebrant. Rev. Nazaire Poirier as deacon. Rev. Father Buote, who was sub-deacon, also preached the sermon. Master of ceremonies was Gerald Steele. Soloist was W/O R. McInnis, and choral music under the direction of organists Phyllis Gaudet and John DesRoché was presented by the Miscouche mixed choir.

Parking space was filled to capacity and crowds lined the main part of the procession route as the parade of floats led by the

R.C.M.P. moved away at 2:30 p.m. from its starting point at the railway station, and followed a route through a large section of the village and ended on the grounds of the new school.

FLOATS FEATURED

The parade, which featured floats of the same artistic craftsmanship as were prepared and presented at other Acadian observances in the Province, included those which represented the Miscouche Canadian Legion, Our Lady of the Assumption, Marguerite Bourgeoys, Ladies of the Holy Family, Miscouche Bank, Queen and Princesses, Acadia, fishermen, Acadian farmer, Acadian handicraft, Gabriel and Evangeline, the deportation, early Acadian wedding, eldest man and woman in Miscouche, and concluding the parade was a little dog all dressed up for the occasion.

Riding in a shiny black convertible in the parade were Mr. Joseph Gaudet, age 90, and Mrs. Madeline Gallant, age 92, the eldest man and woman residing in Miscouche.

At the school Mr. A. J. Poirier acting as chairman and introduced Rev. Martin Monaghan who for 27 years was the spiritual adviser to the people of Miscouche who he was parish priest from 1905 until his retirement in 1945. Other speakers on the program were Judge Sylvère DesRoché and Father Dupre.

In the interesting historical and antique display in the new school were items made and used by the first settlers of Miscouche. Also in the exhibit were spinning wheels, tools, and instruments of various kinds, old pictures, books, and documents, a map of Miscouche made in 1839, the bell from the first church in Miscouche, and numerous items of equal historic interest.—S.

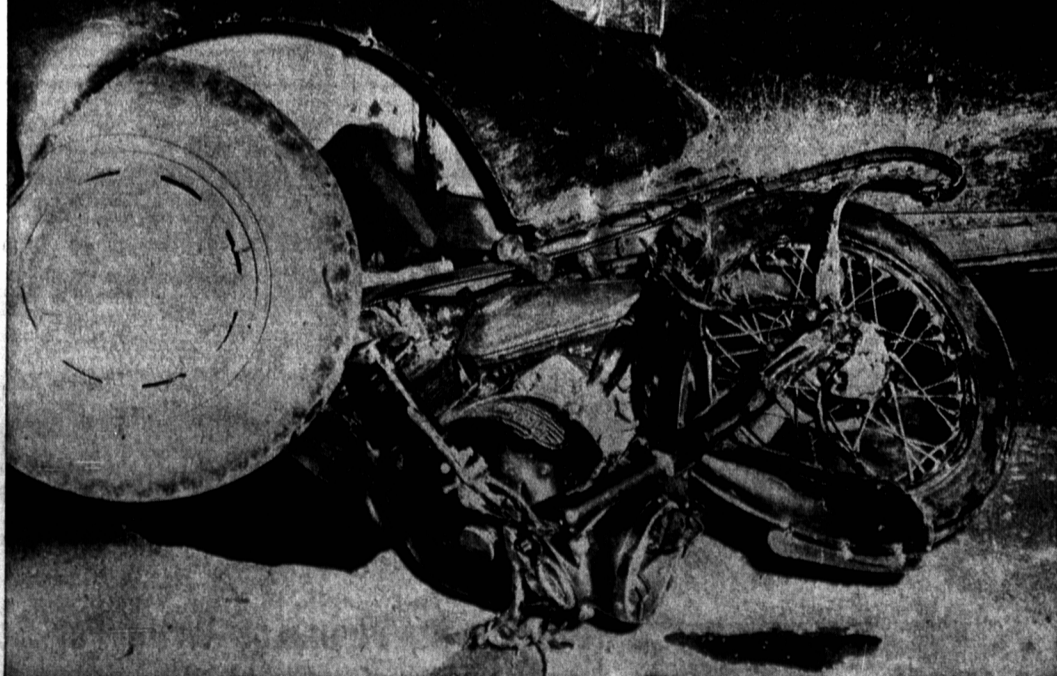
