WATER SUPPLY.—A company has been formed to furnish Springhill, N. S., with a water supply.

SCARLET FEVER.—Two cases of scarlet fever, one of a very malignant type, are reported in Moncton.

A RARE OCCURRENCE.—Plums and blossoms may be seen growing on the one tree in the garden of Mr. James Duffy, Rustico Road.

FIRE.—The alarm this afternoon was for a slight fire on the roof of the railway round-house. The damage did not amount to much.

TYPHOID FEVER.—Charlottetown is not the only city in the Dominion where typhoid fever is prevalent. Woodstock is similarly afflicted. Several deaths have recently occurred from it in the latter place.

SCHOOLS CLOSED.—Owing to the prevalence of scarlet fever in Summerside the schools in that town have been closed until Monday next. The attendance since the holidays has not been twenty-five per cent. of the average.

ILLEGAL FISHING.—Before E. Hackett, Esq., Inspector of Fisheries, to-day, in the Marina and Fisheries Office, Neil Stewart, of Keppock, was fined \$40 for fishing lobsters after close season, in contravention of the Fisheries Act.

SUDDEN DEATH.—We are sorry to learn that the Rev. Father De Finance, of Rustico, has lost a valuable four-year-old Hernando colt. It was only three or four days sick of strangles, previous to Sunday, when it took a relapse, and died yesterday.

A CURIOSITY.—There is on exhibition at the Journal office, Summerside, a curiosity in the shape of a reed twenty-four feet in length. It is about as thick at the butt as a person's little finger, and the joints are about six inches apart. This extraordinary sample of rapid growth was found a few days ago at the South Shore, Miscouche, by Stephen Gaudet, of Miscouche.

A SAD CASE.—The Mail reports that a young man named W. Thompson, who with his wife arrived in Halifax from Charlottetown some three months ago, is now confined in an insane asylum in Philadelphia, to which city he had gone a few weeks ago to visit some relatives. He was sun-struck while bathing. His young wife is very much distracted over the unfortunate occurrence.

THE BONAVISTA.—The SS. Bonavista, Capt. Anderson, arrived here at seven o'clock this morning. She had a general cargo and the following passengers: Mr and Mrs. Pease, Mr L. Smith, Mr Baker, McDonald, Mrs. Crisler, Mr Ottawa, Mrs D C Fraser and son and 14 steerage passengers. She will leave for St. John's, Nfld., with a general cargo and a horse, shipped by George E. Hughes, this afternoon.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—The Summerside Journal says: On Saturday evening last sparks from the engine of the gravel train ignited the dry grass in the rear of Mr. H. C. Mill's warehouse, a space about ten feet square being burned before the flames were discovered and extinguished. Had the flames reached any buildings in the vicinity, the results might have been serious. Never was greater care necessary than at the present, to prevent an outbreak of fire.

A LIVELY OLD MAN.—The Summerside Farmer says: An old man, 78 years of age, named John H. Betts, walked all the way from Nine Mile Creek, which is but a few miles from Charlottetown, to Summerside, the first of the week. He had recently come from Bangor, and came here to see after some freight which he expected, but, to his great disappointment, it had not arrived. He started on Monday and came through Bedouque, crossing in the F. C. Batt on Tuesday.

AN OUTSIDE OPINION.—The Moncton Times says: A meeting of Charlottetown citizens has been held to decide upon a handsome testimonial to Mr. Arthur Newbery on his return from his bride's trip, in appreciation of his great services in beautifying the wastes around the public building of the city. Every visitor to Charlottetown has admired the artistic taste displayed in the arrangement of the grounds and the floral beauties designed by Mr. N., whose exertions for years past in behalf of Charlottetown have been a labor of love, and highly appreciated by both the citizens of, and the visitors to, that pleasant city.

AN OLD SETTLER'S DEATH.—The Moncton Transcript says: Last Wednesday Mr. William Boleyn, of St. Andre, Shediac, went to visit his daughter at Irishtown. On Saturday he was taken ill, and this morning died of cholera. Deceased was in the 69th year of his age, and when an infant in arms came with his parents from Monaghan, Ireland, to P. E. Island, about 32 years ago he moved from the Island to Shediac, where he settled and has lived ever since. He leaves a widow and three sons and four daughters to mourn their loss. Deceased was generally respected.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Late Whitechapel Murder.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.

A London special says that if the woman found in the arch-way at Whitechapel was the victim of Jack the Ripper it is positively sure either that the murderer has been seen by many people, or that another man knew of the murder and all the circumstances so long ago as last Saturday night, and can be found if the police are clever enough. At 1 o'clock on Sunday morning a man called at the London office of the New York Herald and stated that another "Jack the Ripper" murder had been committed, and that the mutilated body had been found in Back Church Lane, in Whitechapel. He gave his name as John Cleary, 21 White Horse Yard, Drury Lane. A reporter went at once to the spot and stated that he could find nothing, and the matter was passed over as unimportant. The moment that the body was found yesterday, however, the events of Sunday morning loomed up with a significance rather colossal and a search was at once made for John Cleary, but not one of that name could be found in or near the locality he had given as his residence. The man's appearance had been carefully noted and search has been made for him.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

The police have discovered no clue to the murderer of the woman whose body was found at Whitechapel yesterday.

Base Ball News.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 11.

The closing game of the New Brunswick league was played to-day between the St. Johns and Monctons, the former winning 20 to 4. The St. Johns pounded Robinson and Burns for 28 total hits, while Cunningham for the home team was only hit for five. Frank White, of the St. Johns, wins the Munro cup offered for the best batting average by a purely amateur player in the league. He has a batting average of .450 runs in nine games. Parsons of the St. Johns leads the league in batting with .461 in twelve games. Soule, of the Monctons, wins the gold medal offered for the Monctonian making the most runs.

The Great London Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

Several more wharfingers have conceded the demands of the strikers, and nearly 1,000 resumed work this morning. The strikers are as resolute as ever in the stand they have taken. Their pickets display greater activity and prevented many batches of new men engaged to take place of strikers from proceeding to the docks. There is a pause in the strike negotiations. Cardinal Manning has postponed his interview with the Directors of the Dock Companies until to-morrow. Burns is ill from overwork, and is taking a day's rest.

Damage to Property.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 11.

The superintendent of the Canada and Atlantic railway has received information from Waterbound City and Atlantic City to the effect that the place is in much better shape than was anticipated. The damage to property was not so serious as at first reported, and there was no loss of life. It is believed that communication by rail with Atlantic City will be effected to-morrow. Fifteen houses were washed away at Sea Isle City, including three hotels. The damage to the railroad is heavy, and it will be weeks before they are put in their former condition.

Stanley Marching On.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 11.

The Movement Geographique states that Stanley is marching toward Mombasa, after fighting his way through the hostile country of Ujora and Ujanda tribes, and conquering the natives. He has the paper says, established the authority of the British East Africa Company over the country from the Upper Nile to the East Coast. The paper declares that it is doubtful if Emin Pascha is accompanying Stanley to the coast.

Ireland's New Viceroy.

DUBLIN, Sept. 11.

The Earl of Zetland, the newly appointed Viceroy of Ireland, will take the oath of office at Dublin Castle on October 1st. He will make his state entry into the city in December.

Woman's Suffrage Clause Defeated.

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 11.

At a constitutional convention yesterday, a majority refused to permit the incorporation of a woman suffrage clause in the effective franchise article.
