WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Budde Patty, who may be the answer to U.S. Davis Cup problems, Monday upset Lew Hoed, the powerful Australian, to reach the men's singles semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

Hoed, a member of the last two Aussie Davis Cup squads, hasn't been playing up to his usual standard. But this takes nothing away from Patty who swept to a convincing straight-set victory, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4.

Top-seeded Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, leading U.S. Davis Cup player, also reached the semi-finals, eliminating defending champion Jaroslav Drobny of Egypt, 6-6, 6-1, 6-4.

Ken Rosewall, Hoed's Davis Cup teammate, and favored to win the Wimbledon singles, defeated towering Sven Davidson of Sweden, 6-4, 6-1, 6-2, using his great backhand to fine effect.

The other semi-finalist will be unseeded Kurt Nielsen of Denmark who came from behind to defeat Italy's Nicola Pietrangeli 1-6, 6-3, 5-7, 6-2, 7-5.

It was a perfect night for racing and the large crowd that turned out at the driving park witnessed an exciting card. Three new records were seen during the evening. **French Auto Racer Sentenced**  
PARIS (AP)—Jean Gamot, a French auto racer, Monday was given a suspended sentence of four months in prison for "unwillingly" provoking the death of another driver and a spectator during trials for a sports car race last year. The court also ordered him to pay the equivalent of \$50,000 to the driver's widow.

The court's ruling was received with special interest since it could serve as a precedent if litigation develops from the Le Mans accident that took 79 lives and left 80 persons injured June 11. Court experts said it is the first time an auto racer has been held responsible for an accident during a race.

**McFater's Welterweight Title At Stake Tonight**  
MONTREAL (CP)—Alan McFater of Toronto puts his welterweight title on the line tonight against the fighter he snatched it from a couple of months ago, Tony Percy of Drummondville, Que.

The 12-rounder has official recognition by the Canadian Boxing Federation.

McFater took the title in a close scrap in Toronto and is confident he can retain it in this next meeting with the tough battler from Drummondville.

McFater, 24, has been fighting as a pro since 1949 and has an over-all record of 28 victories, eight losses and three draws. He won six by knockouts and was stopped once, by Armando Savio of Montreal four years ago. McFater quit boxing for nearly two years to continue his education. Since his return to the ring last fall he has had five straight wins.

Percy turned pro in 1951. Now 21, he has won 20, lost 11 and fought three draws. He won four by knockouts and was stopped twice, by Larry Busching and Paolo Melis in 1953. Percy has had seven fights this year, winning six, and has won two since losing to McFater.

The Drummondville boy has been training with Carmen Basilio, the new world welter champion, in Syracuse in preparation for the title fight.

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—A Sydney professional and a Halifax amateur tied for the lead after the first 18 holes of the 72-hole Nova Scotia open golf championship here Monday.

A field of nine pros and 31 amateurs were paced by Maurice Desjardins of Sydney's Ligan Club and Ashburn's Hattie Morash, each with a three over par 71.

The field competing for the vacant title will tee off for 26 holes today, with the final 18 scheduled when champion Kas Zabrowski of Halifax moved to Ontario.

Pete Doig, who tied with Ed Crowell as the top amateur last year, carded the lone 73, while 74's went to host pro Sam Foley, Ashburn's Eddie Crowell and Lea Windsor and Brightwood entries Rocky Jollymore and Pud Carter.

**Red Sox First Baseman Dies**  
CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Harry Agganis, 25, Boston Red Sox first baseman, who has been ill several weeks, died Monday in hospital.

Doctors said death was believed due to a massive pulmonary embolism.

The Red Sox issued a statement signed by three doctors which said:

"Harry Agganis had been making a slow but apparently satisfactory convalescence from a severe pulmonary infection complicated by phlebitis. Death was believed to have been caused by a massive pulmonary embolism."

After signing with the Red Sox in November, 1952, Agganis hit 281 and connected for 23 homers at Louisville the following season.

Last year he had 11 homers, eight triples and 109 hits in his freshman year with the Red Sox, batting .251. He was batting at a .315 clip this season.

**Bolsters Hope Of Channel Swim**  
PORT DOVER, Ont. (CP)—Gerda (Jiggs) Olsson, 19, of Simcoe bolstered her hope of swimming the English channel Sunday when she swam 15 miles in Lake Erie, qualifying for the \$25,000 Canadian National Exhibition Lake Ontario swim this summer.

The Scottish girl, in Canada only a year, swam the 15 miles in seven hours, averaging 40 strokes a minute. Her coach, Ward Wright, said she swam only 12 miles as the crew flies but shifting currents and crosswinds on the lake lengthened the distance covered.
