Reconstruction Plan Of Old Mill Proposed

MONTAGUE — The reconstruction of the Sutherland mill and dam site was proposed last evening at the meeting of the Montague Regional Board of Trade.

The proposal was made by William Reddin who briefly outlined what he felt would be an outstanding attraction for tourists. Old mills are pictured on calendars and written about, and of interest to all, and this is a beautiful site and a wonderful location for a park and other tourist attractions," he said.

Mr. Reddin also pointed out that mill pieces are still available and men still live that could advise on just how the mill could be reconstructed.

About two years ago the Town of Montague along with industry and natural resources of the province purchased the land on which this mill was situated with the idea of developing into a park and fishing area, this idea was sponsored previously by the South-east Kings Fish and Game Association which has been active ever since in the promotion of the dam. The executive of the board of trade is to look into the matter and will formulate plans if feasible to restore the old mill.

Three New Councillors Elected
 SOURIS — Three new councillors were elected to fill seats on the town council here yesterday.

Out of 238 taxpayers eligible to vote in the election, 218 showed up at the polls.

New councillors are Charles Gillis, with 204 votes; Richard Power, 154; and Sterling Dingwell, 132. Re-elected were Clarence MacDonald, 182; Andrew Meurant, 178; and Walter Solomon, 162.

Defeated in the race were former mayor C.E. LaVie and George MacEachern.

Mayor Roy Leard was elected by acclamation.

The new mayor and council will be sworn into office at the regular council meeting Feb. 8.

Cardigan Tax Rate Unchanged
 CARDIGAN — Joseph McDonald was elected village commissioner for the Village of Cardigan at its annual meeting held last evening.

Noel Wilson, the retiring commissioner, was thanked by the large crowd for his service in the past year with mention being made of the part played in the centennial celebrations. Mr. Wilson took a leading part in the barbecuing of a whole steer. This barbecue attracted the attention of the whole province and was considered to be a huge success.

The tax rate of one half of one percent remains unchanged for the next year and the financial statement showed a surplus for 1964 of \$335. A budget of \$3,000 has been set for 1965.

Fire Chief Alban Brothers advised that the fire department would be re-organized at a meeting to be called shortly and he also advised that new equipment was needed at once.

Some discussion took place over the rink and playgrounds with further action to be taken in the near future.

Mayor Yeo Returned By 21 Votes

MONTAGUE — B.H. Yeo has been returned to office as Mayor of Montague by a majority of 21 votes over Gilbert R. Clements for the second time.

Yeo polled 203 votes while Clements polled 182. In a previous election between the two men Yeo polled 266 and Clements 95.

In yesterday's voting Ward 1 polled 84 for Yeo and 51 for Clements and two ballots were rejected for a total of 137 voters.

In Ward 2 Yeo polled 119 and Clements 131 with two rejected ballots for a total of 252.

In the race for the council seats a narrow margin of only five votes between Leonard Munroe and John Hughes existed and a recount was ordered by the returning officer. Hughes won the seat with the small margin of five and is returned for the sixth term. The result of the council vote was Frank Greene 177, Dr. A.E. Ings 161, John Hughes 135, and Leonard Munroe 130.

Eighty per cent of the taxpayers were eligible to vote and approximately 80 per cent of this number did vote.

Leonard Munroe stated after the returns he was pleased with the results and would try again. Gilbert Clements also indicated he would be around for the next election.

Mayor B.H. Yeo stated last night he was very unsure for a time just what the result would be but felt he would win. Mayor Yeo went as far as about five minutes before the polls closed to predict 60-40 for himself in Ward 1 and 70-30 for Clements in Ward 2. This figure is accurate within eight per cent approximately in each poll.

Gilbert Clements has predicted a close contest and hoped to win.

After his victory Mayor Yeo said "I wish to express my sincere thanks to the citizens of Montague for electing me mayor of their town for the eighth consecutive term. The contest was fair and square and was a clean campaign. Congratulations to my opponent. This is the happiest of my lifetime and I do not have words to express my feelings. May I be worthy of your trust."

Regional Development Aims Not Yet Defined By Council

FREDERICTON (CP)—The Economic Council of Canada has yet to define targets for regional development, Prof. William Y. Smith said Tuesday night.

Prof. Smith, who heads the economics and political science department at the University of New Brunswick, told a conference of Atlantic provinces labor officers he would give the council and its chairman, Dr. J. J. Deutsch, "two cheers" for setting such formidable goals as were outlined in its first report and for looking ahead to even more difficult objectives beyond 1970.

"If Dr. Deutsch and his council come up with something as good on regional development as they have on national development, then it will be three cheers," he said.

Prof. Smith said that in international trade Canada must be less concerned with opening up markets for raw and semi-processed materials and be more concerned about markets for manufactured goods. The economic council's review had furnished little comfort to advocates of increased protectionism for Canada.

He said the Atlantic region must support the council on its advocacy of freer trade in the North Atlantic area.

"We must develop more manufacturing industries in the Atlantic region," he said. "Our natural markets for these goods lie not down that 'long cold corridor to Central Canada' but on the eastern seaboard of the United States, in Britain and in the European Common Market."

Artist Lawren P. Harris Gives Talk On His Works

Lawren P. Harris, head of the fine arts department of Mt. Allison University, spoke last evening to the members of the Confederation Art Gallery.

Mr. Harris briefly reviewed his life as an artist and told of the influences on his work during his life.

The group of 14 paintings now on exhibition in the Confederation Art Gallery were influenced by a non-figurative painted mural he did for a university building and by the designing of five mosaic decorations for five other campus buildings.

"I became excited about creating mural-like paintings, similar in form to the architect-commissioned ones," said Mr. Harris, "but smaller in size and

Mr. Harris was introduced to the 40-odd members gathered by Moncrieff Williamson, curator of the Confederation Gallery.

Following his talk Mr. Harris showed some 35 slides of his previous work to illustrate the development of his work, from the time he had just finished art school and was living in Toronto prior to the outbreak of World War II until the present.

He was thanked on behalf of those present by Mr. Williamson.
