"That's a cold way of not being exactly hostile," he explained to a press conference. "There was plenty of disagreement at times. There were many points that were not understood. A meeting of the minds had to be reached, and was reached," he said. He refused to be more specific.

Kinney said the meeting was slow to get underway. He finally broke the ice by saying, "let's sit down to business." The meeting lasted from 9:47 A.M. until noon, and from 2:00 P.M. until 3:30 P.M.

He identified the top Red negotiator as a Col. Chang of the North Korean Army. Chang did most of the Red talking. A Lt. Col. Chi, who represented the Chinese, had a small voice in the proceedings. A Lt. Col. Kim of the North Korean army kept entirely silent.

Kinney's fellow members were Col. J. G. Murray, U. S. Marine Corps, and Col. Soan Young Lee, of the Republic of Korea Army. The home where the meeting was held was decorated simply, Kinney said. There was no Communist propaganda placards in sight, and none of the usual pictures of Stalin, Mao Tze-Tung or other Red big shots.

team. Kinney hesitated a moment and replied "I'm probably not many commanders give their staff such good backing as General Ridgway, I doubt if the enemy party felt as free to make decisions as we did." The liaison groups had no authority other than to set the stage for the full-scale meetings starting Tuesday.

Vital Problems

Here are two of the biggest problems that will have to be decided first, assuming that a ceasefire is agreed on:

1. On what line will the opposing armies settle while the non-military aspects of the truce are worked out? 2. Will the U. N. have the right to aerial or ground reconnaissance to see that the Reds carry out their part of the bargain; and will the Reds have the same right to inspect Allied positions?

No one knows how many meetings will be held in Kaesong. No one can predict what will happen if the negotiations fail. Some Allied officers say the Reds have used the last three weeks of comparative quiet to rest and rebuild their forces all along the front, particularly in the west.

If negotiations fail, these officers say, the Communists may launch a new, powerful offensive, aimed at driving the Allies into the sea. The same officers say the battle-hardened troops of the free world are ready for whatever the Reds might throw. The feeling around Eighth Army Headquarters is that chances are good for peace in Korea.

'BROKEN ARROW' IS TRULY GREAT MOVIE

Distinguished as much by its theme as by its talent, as much by its action as by its beauty, "Broken Arrow" leaves the line of merely superior motion pictures that enhance any given movie year and finds its natural place in that circle of excellence that is reserved for the perfection of any craft.
