

IN MEMORIAM

MR. FRANK G. MURPHY

Great was the gloom over the community of Summerville, P. E. I. on Monday morning, September 27th, 1954, when a message from Charlottetown bore the sad tidings that Mr. Frank G. Murphy had breathed his last at the home of his brother, Albert, in Parkdale.

Mr. Murphy had gone to Charlottetown on Sunday evening expecting to do a business errand early on Monday morning. During the night he suffered a fatal heart attack. The last rites of the Catholic Church were administered by Reverend Francis Corcoran of St. Dunstan's Basilica Staff.

Frank Murphy was born in Summerville, King's County, forty-one years ago, the son of Daniel and the late Mrs. (Mary Kelly) Murphy. By profession he was a contractor and builder and was widely known throughout the eastern part of the Province where he had acquired for himself a host of friends by his honesty and excellent workmanship. His amiable personality endeared him to all who knew him whether old or young. He was truly an admirable type of Christian manhood, always cheerful and enthusiastic and feared no sacrifice when called upon to do his duty for God or neighbor. He was singularly devoted to his small children and it seemed fitting that his last earthly act should have been a purchase for his little daughter who is a victim of celiac disease and so a constant object of his care and solicitude. To our way of thinking this devoted husband and father was indispensable to his now sorrowing wife and little children but God in His inscrutable manner has willed otherwise. Sustained by their splendid faith they will carry on remembering ever that "I can do all things in Him who strengthens me." The loving Eternal Father who permitted the cross will Himself be a Father to the so sorely bereaved.

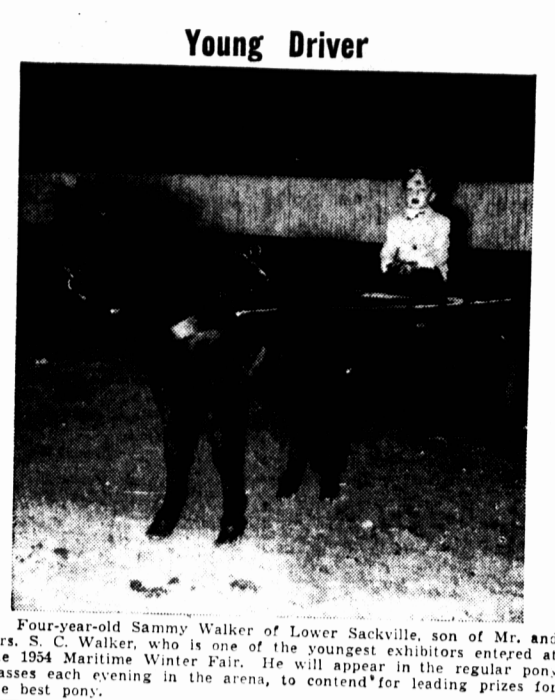
