

# 85 Candidates Already in Running in N.S. Election

HALIFAX (CP) — Eighty-five candidates have entered the scramble for Nova Scotia's 43 legislative seats and the field will be larger when voters make their choice in a provincial election Oct. 30. Nomination day is Oct. 16.

Generally it's a straight two-party fight between Liberals headed by Premier Henry Hicks and Progressive Conservatives led by lawyer Robert L. Stanfield.

Michael McDonald, provincial CCF chief, said Thursday his party plans to enter the field in six ridings, mostly in the Cape Breton industrial area.

Liberals and Conservatives will contest all 43 seats.

**DEBATE ROADS**  
Country roads are the most talked-about subject so far and more argument is expected before

voters have the final word.

Progressive Conservative leader Stanfield says his party will start paving all secondary roads "ready or near ready for paving" if the people elect his party.

Premier Hicks says there are 7,786 miles of highway in this category and it would cost \$200,000,000 to pave them, more than the province can afford right now.

Mr. Stanfield says if there are more than 1,000 miles ready for paving it "will certainly be there to the people of every country."

No party has spelled out a specific platform yet but Mr. Hicks outlined a "four-point program" for the Liberals when he announced the election Sept. 18. He promised a \$100,000,000 highway program, \$30,000,000 for power development, more aid to municipalities and government grants for hospitals and nursing homes.

**PLAN EXPRESS HIGHWAYS**  
Mr. Stanfield has promised to

build express highways in the Halifax and Sydney areas. He also said he would reorganize the provincial trade and industry department to step up promotion of new industries.

Progressive Conservative candidates met here Thursday to hammer out a manifesto. It is expected to be made public in a few days. Premier Hicks says the Liberals will issue a detailed platform "in due course." CCF leader McDonald says his party will announce a program soon.

In the last election in 1953 the Liberals elected 23 members to a 37-seat legislature. Progressive Conservatives 12 and the CCF two. At dissolution the standing was: Liberals 19, Progressive Conservatives 13, CCF two, vacant three.

Redistribution increased membership in the next House by six seats.

## Expect Krushchev To Report On Yalta Conference Shortly

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Communist party leader Nikita Khrushchev is expected to report on his current talks with Yugoslav President Tito to the party's central committee within two or three weeks, diplomatic sources said Monday night.

The central committee, the party's most powerful elected organ, has been expected for some time to meet — primarily to discuss the course of the de-Stalinization campaign. It will be the committee's first full session since Khrushchev laid down the de-Stalinization line at the party congress in February.

One main subject of the coming meeting is the impact this line has had on East European Communist countries.

(Reports in Belgrade speculated that other Communist leaders in Eastern Europe may follow Hungary's party chief in participating in the current Tito-Khrushchev talks. Tito is reported to be seeking greater freedom for the Com-

unist countries.)

Soviet consideration of the Eastern European situation has appeared more urgent as a result of Khrushchev's surprise journey to Yugoslavia two weeks ago and Tito's equally surprising return with the Soviet leader to the Crimea for further talks.

Nothing has been published here on the purpose of the Khrushchev-Tito meetings. Reports in the Soviet press have described both trips as purely of a holiday nature.

The Soviet press has not reported a Yugoslav spokesman's statement that the two leaders have been discussing differences, chiefly ideological, between the Yugoslav and Soviet outlook.

No comment is available from Soviet sources.

It is considered unlikely the Yugoslav statement would have been issued without Khrushchev being informed by Tito of his intention.

**Israel Blasts U.N. Truce Organization**  
JERUSALEM (CP)—Israel accused the United Nations truce supervision organization Wednesday of failing to meet its responsibilities in maintaining peace along the Israeli-Jordanian border.

The foreign ministry notified Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, chief of the United Nations truce observers, that it "sees no useful purpose in continued routine examinations of border incidents" and will boycott further meetings of the Israel - Jordan armistice commission.

A foreign ministry spokesman explained that Israel will continue to submit complaints to the commission, but will not participate in the discussion of such complaints or of Jordanian complaints against Israel.

**Plan Regional Parole Offices**  
TORONTO (CP) — Additional regional parole offices will be opened early next year at Wainipeg, Toronto and Moncton, N.B., Justice Minister Garson said Wednesday in a speech before the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society.

Mr. Garson said supervision and guidance was available last year to 75 per cent of all parolees from federal prisons. At the same time, the number of parolees was increasing—from 792 in 1952 to 1,343 last year.

Parole formerly was considered to be largely a matter of exercise of mercy by the Crown as a result of good behavior by the prison inmate. But parole policy now was based on evidence of the inmate's reformation and of his ability to lead a law-abiding life.
