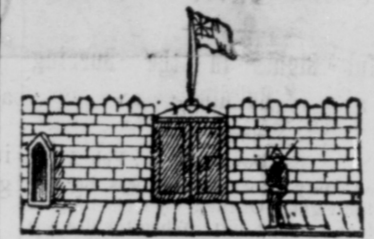

## Cigarette Bugs

A St. Louis physician has made the discovery that cigarettes are infested by a culicoid insect which he considers a poison, and he attributes many mysterious cases of bronchial affections to this source. The germ of the cigarette habit has not yet been revealed by the microscope, but there is room for the suspicion that the habit itself is an "illness," and the next achievement of science may be to appy out its special bacillus.

Von Molke has said that Germany has more to fear from beer than from all the armies of France.

Alcohol in beer, alcohol in brandy, in wine, in cider or in any beverage is a lurking evil.

It is a dangerous narcotic; a virulent poison, which should be classed with, and handled like, our dangerous drugs; it is not a stimulant; it lowers the temperature of the body and diminishes the power of muscular contraction; taken in small quantities it creates an uncontrollable desire for more, an appetite that grows by what it feeds upon, the disease of alcoholism.

There is no safety but in total abstinence. A knowledge of the laws of heredity teaches that there are multitudes of children with an inherited taste for drink—that the blight and curse of King Alcohol brood over all.

Gladstone accounts for the increasing drunkenness in Great Britain by what he calls "The accumulated mass of heredity."

In view of this fact we must conclude that the next generation will be more drunken than any preceding one, if some great means of prevention is not resorted to.

The popular fallacies which lead to the formation of drinking habits, to alcoholism, must be dispelled before appetite is formed if the innocent, engaging, children of today are to be saved from the slough of drunkenness. Hence the necessity for the introduction into school, of all grades, of the science of Physiology and Hygiene with direct reference to the harmfulness of alcohol and other narcotics.

Let us thank God and take courage that this work of prevention is grandly begun; that already there are millions of American, and hundreds of thousands of Canadian children, under compulsory scientific education laws.

A child properly warned, goes forth clad in a coat of mail.

Illustrated text books on Physiology and Hygiene, the fourth part, at least, of the first two books of the series teaching the harmfulness of alcohol and other narcotics, should be put into the hands of all our pupils.

The use of manikins, and of physiological charts, by capable teachers, would also tend greatly toward the successful teaching of these subjects.

The knowledge which is to warn our children away from pitfalls, which will surely be laid for them, should not be in any way slurred over. A knowledge which, more than any other, is calculated to ensure the future safety of the home, and consequently of the nation, should be religiously imparted.

May God grant that the teachers of our Canadian children and youth may not have "too serene a conscience."

Upon then rests the responsibility of imparting scientific temperance instruction in such a manner that it will be interesting to the children; in such a manner that the truths concerning alcohol and narcotics will be so clearly and vividly brought before their minds that they may be convincing; and to leave a lasting impression upon them.

The evils of the tobacco vice should also be set prominently forward.

The boy should be taught that the use of tobacco—instead of making him a man, as he supposes—will prevent him ever arriving at perfect manhood.

Especially should the harmfulness of cigarette smoking be dwelt upon; as it not only fastens the tobacco habit upon the young smokers, but the terrible chains of the opium vice. The fact that indulgence in either of these vices tends to the dwarfing of mind and body; to insanity, idiocy and early death should be emphasized.

The future welfare of the Canadian people is largely in the hands of Canadian teachers. The present generation of children properly instructed means the nation saved in the not far distant future.

## The Export of Gold.

The continued export of gold is causing uneasiness in the States. It is held by Mr. Henry Clews that the disturbing influences are partly political and partly monetary. The startling Panama revelations in Paris have so shaken confidence in the French Government as to cause a severe contraction of credit operations by the Bank of France and by the other Paris financial institutions, the natural tendency of which has been to draw gold to that centre. Similar but more recent developments of official corruption in Italy have given an impetus to this derangement in credit operations and have widened its area. And the remarkable declaration of Chancellor Caprivi as to the threatening armaments of the great powers and the consequent necessity for Germany immediately putting herself in a position for undertaking "aggressive" operations cannot but bring over Europe a sense of its nearness to the great struggle which has so long appeared inevitable, but not hitherto actually imminent. The new Egyptian question looms up as still another disturbing factor. From similar political causes, Russia has during the past year been steadily withdrawing her deposits on the continent, which are supposed to have gone into her military chest; and it is suspected that the hoarding of Austria-Hungary has also been for military contingencies, as well as for her preparations for establishing a gold financial basis. The distinctly monetary causes of this gold movement have been the apprehension incident to the position of silver and the failure of the Brussels Conference to devise any means for staying its demonization. To the Bank of France this is a grave situation. Having issued notes to the full amount permitted by its charter, it can put out no more paper for the procurement of gold, and in the event of a crisis might have to use its silver in making payments; which, under the present state of the silver situation, might prove to the last degree perilous. Under these circumstances the Bank has to enforce liquidation of its loans, and the Paris joint-stock banks are following suit, especially such of them as have branches in London, by stopping purchases of English bills; the effect of which is to draw gold to Paris notwithstanding the Bank's inability to make direct purchases of gold. Concurrently with these influences, the absorption of gold by Austria, for the purpose of establishing the gold standard, is continued without abatement. The effect of these political and monetary conditions is apparent in the fact that the Bank of France now holds \$37,000,000 more gold than a year ago, whilst the Austro-Hungarian Bank shows an increase in its holdings of \$25,000,000. The combined accumulation of these two banks—amounting to \$62,000,000—almost exactly corresponds with the net export of gold from the United States in 1892, which is officially stated at \$69,000,000. The connection of cause and effect is here so obvious as to tell its own story. This transference has come about through a natural banking process. The contraction of large credit operations on the Continent has necessitated a like restriction of credits in Great Britain, and that in turn has caused some contractions of credits in England's relations with the United States and has induced withdrawals of bankers' balances from employment in this country. This seems to be about the only rational explanation of our large losses of gold in the face of a condition of foreign trade that did not call for such remittances.
