Committed For Trial

Francis William Quinn, city, was committed to stand trial before judge and jury when he appeared in City Police Court yesterday. He is charged with breaking and entry with intent to commit theft. Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, presided. He was remanded to Dec. 18. Charles McQuaid, QC, is acting as counsel for the accused. The charge of false pretence with intent to defraud the T. Eaton Co. against Kenneth B. Burgoyne, Saint John, N.B. was dismissed.

The accused was convicted on a second charge of false pretences with intent to defraud Holmans of P.E.I. He was remanded to Dec. 22 for sentencing. Frank Sigsworth is acting as counsel for the accused. Wilfred B. Burke, city, pleaded not guilty to the charge of failing to supply additional information on request to the federal department of income tax. His case was adjourned to Jan. 14.

Two city residents, charged with disorderly conduct, were fined \$30 and costs, or 15 days. A city resident was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days for being drunk and incapable. A city man was remanded to Dec. 24 for being drunk and disorderly. Another city resident was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegally possessing liquor.

Liberal Brass Visits Plants

GEORGETOWN — The new leader of the provincial Liberal party, Alex B. Campbell, paid his first visit to George own yesterday, since winning the nod of approval from a provincial convention one week ago.

Mr. Campbell spent more than two hours in the Kings County capital during which time he and his party were conducted on a tour of both Gulf Gardens Foods Ltd. plant and the ship building plant of Bathurst Marine Ltd.

Mr. Campbell was accompanied by Arthur MacDonald, MLA for Fifth Kings; Daniel MacDonald, MLA for First Kings; Frank Jardine, MLA, for Fourth Kings, and Thomas Kichham, former federal member for Kings.

Hovercraft Link Discussion Held

Discussions concerning the suitability of a hovercraft service between West Prince

county and New Brunswick were held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

The meeting was attended by Premier Walter R. Shaw, other government officials, a number of city councillors, members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, and a representative of a Toronto hovercraft company. According to Robert Grindlay, MLA, Ellerslie, "such a service revitalizing the whole economy of West Prince."

The hovercraft is an amphibious type of vehicle which operates on a cushion of air, hovering—as the name implies—just above the surface of land or water. The craft can travel at speeds of 80 m.p.h. and can carry 30 vehicle and about 90 passengers. One of the principal advantages of this type of craft for transportation is the elimination of costly terminal facilities.

A spokesman for the company said one service between the mainland and the Isle of Wight off the south coast of England has been in operation for some time and has proven successful.

Three Charged In Assault Case
