noted that there was an excellent representation from the smaller, and possibly undeveloped, nations such as Pakistan and Burma. Dr. Shaw was the official representative of the Canadian Education Association. The conference was held under the auspices of the International Bureau of Education and U.N.E.S.C.O. whose headquarters are in Paris.

There were three main topics for discussion. The first concerned the reports of delegates of each nation with respect to the educational progress in that country, especially in the past year. The second dealt with women in education, while the third opened up a wide field of discussion on the value of teaching the natural sciences in the secondary school level. Dr. Shaw also served as the committee dealing with this latter study. The committees were named to make recommendations to all member nations regarding the findings as a result of the study of the groups.

Visit To Paris

After leaving Geneva, Dr. Shaw went to Paris where, at the suggestion of the Canadian Education Association, he spent two days at the headquarters of UNESCO in Paris, interviewing the heads of the various branches of the Education Section. From the French capital he went to London where he visited the British Ministry of Education. While there he also had talks with the Scottish representative of education in London and with members of the League of the British Commonwealth and Empire. It is through the latter organization that the annual teacher exchange between Canada and the United Kingdom is arranged.

The Director of Education took the opportunity of visiting one familiar scene when he went to Scotland for a brief holiday. He spent a couple of days wandering around Edinburgh after a call at the Scottish Education Office in St. Andrew's House.

Dr. Shaw expressed himself as greatly pleased at the courtesy shown him at Canada House in London where officials did everything possible to add to the enjoyment of his visit and to expedite business matters for him. He said they were most helpful in arranging interviews, obtaining accommodations at hotels and providing for transportation.

Hospitality At Geneva

He also expressed appreciation for the sincere welcome afforded at Geneva and the efforts made by people there to be helpful at all times. It was while he was in the famous city that he met Miss Lyne Creel, a sister of Dr. P. A. Creelman of the staff of the Sanatorium, this city. Miss Creel is a nurse with the World Health Organization in Geneva.

Another interesting experience awaited him in Paris when on one of the busiest streets of that European centre he met the Misses Jean and Doris Gill of Charlottetown. They are presently enjoying a European holiday and accidentally met Dr. Shaw on the Champ Elysees.

Dr. Shaw could not help commenting on the speed with which transportation is developing in another generation. He remarked that he left Montreal by air late in the afternoon of July 4 and the following afternoon he was in his Geneva hotel room. On his return they departed from London at 6 o'clock Sunday evening and were in Dorval airport, Montreal at 5 o'clock Monday morning.

Alberta Truckmen Return To Work

CALGARY, Alta., July 29 (CP) - Alberta dump truck operators, nearly 1,000 in number, returned to work on projects throughout the province today after a week-long strike that cost contractors an estimated \$120,000.

The truckers went on strike in support of a demand for a two-cent boost in the yard-mile and ton-mile haulage rates.

The truckers agreed to return to work after Alberta Highways Minister Gordon Taylor promised an arbitrator would mediate in the dispute within 20 days.

Inquest Last Night In Death Of D. S. Semple

At an inquest in Summerside last evening presided over by Dr. Austin Delaney to inquire into the death of David Stewart Semple of Clermont, a coroner's jury returned the following verdict:

"We believe the said David Stewart Semple came to instant death as a result of a collision with the right hand windshield of a 1951 Oldsmobile sedan, N. B. license plate 35,245 proceeding in an easterly direction on July 26, 1952, and driven by Arthur Merrill Rayner of Moncton, N. B., formerly of Clermont, P. E. I., and that the time of the accident was between 10:15 and 10:30 p. m. at a spot on the north side of the Summerside road approximately 1-2 mile west of Kensington. We believe that the driver made an effort to avoid a collision."

Dr. W. P. McBride, Kensington, the first of nine persons from whom testimony was received, told of being called to the scene of the accident. He said he found the man dead on his arrival and described the apparent injuries.

A statement from Dr. R. W. Auld, Kensington said the deceased had suffered multiple fractures of the body, including both legs broken.

Other injuries, he said included hemorrhage of the brain, fractured skull, and dislocated right shoulder.

Miss Erna H. Webb, school teacher, Moncton, N. B., a passenger in the car at the time of the accident, reviewed the events that occurred on the evening of the accident. She estimated their speed at between 40-50 miles per hour. She said that when first sighted, the deceased was approaching from the right hand side of the road from which the car was travelling. Just as the driver averted to miss striking the bicycle, the deceased also averted in the same direction.

The bicycle appeared to wobble and be out of control. When impact came she had to shut eyes as a precaution against the flying glass from the broken windshield. There was no liquor in the car and no one to her knowledge had consumed any liquor.

Arthur Merrill Rayner, 32, salesman from Moncton, and driver of the car, told he and Miss Webb arriving on P. E. I. about 8:30 that evening; of calling on friends in New Annan who accompanied them on the trip towards Kensington. He described fully the events which happened and of his efforts to avoid striking the bicycle which apparently cut across in front of him. After the accident he had been driven to Kensington by someone, and from there had called a doctor and the R. C. M. P.

He had not had anything to drink other than 2-3 of a bottle of Silver Tip (a beverage sold in many stores and restaurants on the Island) about an hour previous to the accident. Brakes were good on the car.

Mrs. Mae Jarvis, New Annan; Mrs. Mae Clark, Kensington; and Miss Olive Dalziel, New Annan, passengers in the car, corroborated the evidence of Miss Webb and Mr. Rayner.

Sgt. P. L. Keyes, and Constables L. H. Beveridge and H. M. Bell of the Summerside detachment of the R. C. M. P. gave evidence of police investigation.

J. Harold Goodwin, crown prosecutor, represented the crown.

The coroner's jury were: Wallace Moase (foreman), David Clark Edwin MacGougan, Justin Woodside, Hillard Woodside, Douglas Webster, and Frank Glover. -S-

St. Laurent Plans To Attend Prime Ministers' Parley

OTTAWA, July 29 (CP) - Prime Minister St. Laurent plans to attend "all or part" of the Commonwealth prime ministers' conference to be held in London next November, officials said today.

The conference, announced by Prime Minister Churchill in London, will be the first in almost two years. It will deal principally with economic problems besetting the Commonwealth, particularly the hard-pressed sterling area.

Canada's role at the conference, officials said, will be one of proffering advice on how sterling-area countries may overcome balance-of-payments difficulties threatening Britain with bankruptcy.

But there will be no question of granting Britain another loan, they added. The U. K. government has made no request for additional financial aid. Canada's last loan to Britain was in 1946. It totalled \$1,180,000,000.

The conference will be preceded by other important discussions in London and in Mexico City. Senior Commonwealth financial officials, including a delegation from Canada, will meet in London within the next eight weeks.
