

Marketing Of Potatoes And Turnips Discussed

The Prince County Federation of Agriculture held its annual meeting last evening in the Baptist hall, Summerside with Colin Waugh, Wilton Valley acting as chairman. A large number of farmers and other interested parties were in attendance.

A panel discussion on the marketing of potatoes and turnips was chaired by W. R. Shaw, with D. A. MacDonald, E. D. Reid, and Roland MacDonald as panel members. The panel concluded that warehouse grading and greater uniformity of pack are desirable and that the potato market is confined mainly to Eastern Canada. They felt the outlook is brighter for future marketing in this part of Canada due to increased population and industrial expansion.

Much discussion by the panel centred on ways of expanding the U.S. market but with the present tariff structure this was agreed to be almost an impossibility. Resolutions were approved. These were concerning the obtaining of the services of a resident veterinarian for West Prince; providing information to the producer concerning check testing of milk and cream butterfat by Department of Agriculture; installation of a system of wireless telephones in

(Standard Time). The new directors appointed, replacing the five retiring officers are: 1st district, Hudson Fridham, Montrose; 2nd district, George Shaw, Cap. RCAF Station Entertains Island Medical Ass'n

R. C. A. F. Station Summerside last night played host to the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Medical Association when the Island group held their regular meeting. Forty-two civilian and service medical men were guests of Group Captain W. H. Swetnam, commanding officer of the station, at a dinner meeting held in the officers mess of the local station. Earlier in the evening the executive of the group held a business meeting at the home of the president, Dr. John Downing of Summerside.

Guest lecturer at the session was Dr. N. G. B. MacLetchie, M.D., Ch.B., professor of pathology at Dalhousie University and provincial pathologist for the Province of Nova Scotia. A native of Scotland, Dr. MacLetchie has had a distinguished career in the field of pathology. He attended the famed medical school at Glasgow University and graduated in 1938. He was pathologist for the city of Glasgow until 1942 at which time he received an honorary M.D. and entered the Royal Army Medical Corps.

Dr. MacLetchie served in India and France until he received his discharge in 1946. Returning to civilian life he became senior lecturer in pathology at Bristol University for several years before coming to Canada. In this country he was pathologist for the city of Regina for three years before accepting his present post in Nova Scotia. Among other guests present were Air Force medical officers from Summerside, Halifax, Chatham and Greenwood.

Man Seriously Injured Loading Potato Steamer

The condition of Reginald Gallant, age 18 years of Mt. Carmel who was seriously injured yesterday morning while working on board a potato boat at the Marine Wharf in Summerside was reported last night by Prince County Hospital authorities to be unchanged. He was still in a semi-conscious condition and very restless.

The accident occurred yesterday morning about 8.00 o'clock while Gallant was working on the deck of the potato boat Francis Chovin now loading potatoes for H. B. Willis Inc. As far as could be learned he had been attempting to remove a tarpaulin from a hatch and in doing so fell into the hold of the ship from the icy deck, striking his head on the steel beam below.

His injuries are considered as very serious and consist of a possible skull fracture and brain concussion. It had not been decided last evening if he would be moved to Halifax for an operation. Mr. Gallant is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gallant of Mt. Carmel.

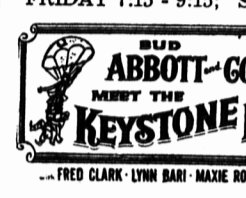

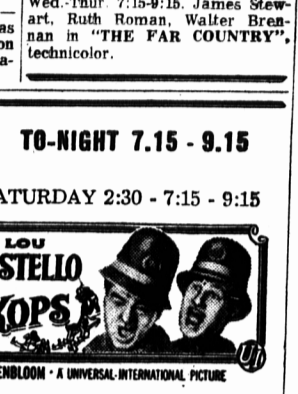

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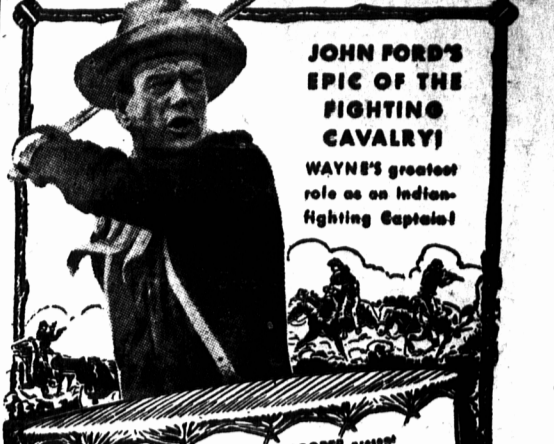
