TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Political Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29. A writ has been issued for a new election in Stanstead County. Nomination December 9th, polling a week later.

At Rimouski yesterday the nominations of L. L. Asselin, Conservative, and Aug. Tessier, Grit, were made. Both are advocates and residents of Rimouski.

Attorney General Martin of Manitoba proposes calling a conference to consider a proposal to unite Manitoba to the Northwest Territories in one province with one local government.

La Catellier, now a chief clerk, has been appointed Under Secretary of State vice Grant Powell resigned.

The Cronin Murder.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29. The local news bureau says that Detective Flynn, who locked Dan Coughlin up at the time of his arrest, informed Chief Hubbard to-day, as if he had just thought of it, that Coughlin gave him two knives on that occasion which, at Coughlin's request, he locked up in a safety vault.

The knives were secured to-day and taken to one of Cronin's friends who identified them as the dead Doctor's property. When questioned about the matter this afternoon Chief Hubbard admitted its truth and declared that he believed that the Cinn-Gael influence induced Flynn to suppress the matter until too late to use as evidence in the pending case.

A Bungled Execution.

GUELPH, Ont., Nov. 29. The last act in the Harvey tragedy was enacted this morning at 8 o'clock. The execution was one of the worst pieces of bungling ever witnessed. The weight which lifted the body was not heavy enough, and the scaffold not high enough to give sufficient rebound to break the neck, and the struggles and contortions of the victim were frightful as he slowly strangled to death.

As if to add to the horrors the knot slipped and caught in front of the ear, and the gurgling sounds in the throat could be heard outside the jail wall.

A Disastrous Cyclone.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Nov. 29. A cyclone passed over Bufford County yesterday blowing down houses and tearing up trees. The residence of a farmer near Washington was blown to pieces, and the family of six persons killed. A factory was blown down and 26 people killed and many others badly injured. But meagre reports have come to hand.

A Timely Move.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 29. The Government has abolished the Provincial Council of Nobles of the Baltic Provinces, and substituted the ordinary assemblies of colleges and private committees, whereby the aristocracy which hitherto ruled the populace independently of the government will be suppressed.

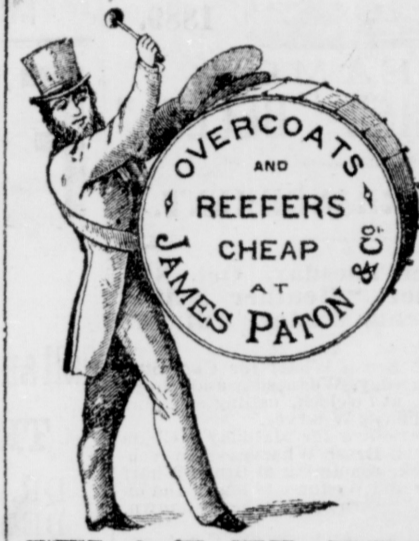

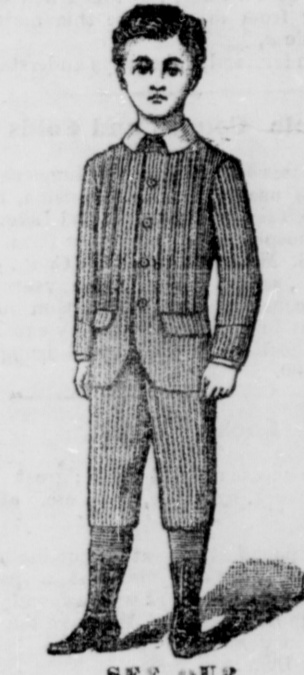
