Ordination At Grand River

Rev. Thomas MacLellan, Grand River, was ordained to the holy priesthood yesterday morning by Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown at Grand River. A large congregation attended the ordination ceremony and mass which took place at 10:30 a. m. His Excellency, the Bishop offered the mass assisted by Rev. George A. MacDonald and Rev. R. G. Ellsworth of St. Dunstan's University. Father MacLellan was assisted by Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley of St. Dunstan's University and Rev. J. W. McCordie, Chancellor of the Diocese was master of ceremonies. The Bishop was met at the entrance to the church by the pastor Rev. W. D. MacDonald. Rev. George A. MacDonald preached the ordination sermon. Sport Echoes From Prince County

The Curran & Briggs baseball club is now perched in the old familiar position, at the top of the roost. They'd better not go to sleep there, however, because the other three teams will be clawing away at them all the time, and all three are capable of making plenty of trouble for last year's Maritime champs. The C. & B. boys haven't been beaten yet, either in league or exhibition games, by the other members of the league, but they've had some close calls.

One thing is sure. Either we have a flock of remarkably able pitchers, or a gang of remarkably helpless hitters in the Physical Fitness Island League. With the exception of Curran & Briggs' stick work against McCulloch in the last game in Summerside, the base hits have been as scarce as rainy days this spring. If this trend gets any more pronounced, we'll be presenting any batter who gets a base hit with a silver cup.

We don't want to take anything away from the pitchers. Such fingers as Bernard Stewart, Ryan, Jack and Phil Murphy, McAleer, are better than average, perhaps. But they're not as good as they have been made to look since baseball got under way this season. If you don't believe this, invite a mainland team over for an exhibition game and if they get no more than four hits, we'll take it all back. If you except Curran & Briggs' eleven hits against McCulloch, the average hits per game is now below four.

The R.C.A.F. team will do it if they can get hold of another pitcher or two. As it is, their pitching is just not good enough. Murphy can't pitch all the games, and we haven't seen anyone else on the Royal team that can hold his own against Island League clouting, even in its current slump. It will be still worse when the boys get back their batting eyes.

With St. John or Barlow at first, Richard at second, Frances in short field and Bovain at the hot corner, their infield is as capable as any in the league. Bovain looked terrific in his first game. Richard gets better each time out. Did we suggest that this boy might not be a hitter? Forget you ever heard it, folks. He has batted those nasty words right back in our face.

There ought to be something done about their right field. If an outfielder can't hit, he doesn't belong on the ball team. An infielder, if his defensive work is particularly good, may get by with some pretty weak sticking, but never a patroller of the outer gardens. And that reminds us. What has become of Martineau? There's a batter who could really give the apple a ride. Hope he hasn't been posted elsewhere.

Benny Grady looks as if he might make the grade at third. He has the best whip in the business, and though apparently a little weak on plays in which thrown balls come to the hot corner, we believe a little more experience at third will clear that up. Benny hasn't been a fence buster, with the willow so far, but he tags the ball well in practice sessions, and may improve.

Louie Mitchell is a real find. He can handle the catching chores O. K. and is a real slugger in the batter's box. He got a nice hit Wednesday, and was robbed of another by Stan Richard. The R.C.A.F. strategy board paid him the compliment of walking him intentionally with Syl Bernard the next batter. Syl didn't take kindly to this and slammed a hit to left field to show them their mistake.

Sgt. Bill Beatty of Summerside has been doing some nice shooting in Charlottetown, making the team that will shoot off with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for Maritime supremacy, but being forced to pass this opportunity up. Bill led all marksmen on the first day of the shoot.

Hoiman's and Schurman's will tangle in the first softball game of the season at the Summerside High School diamond this evening. This will be an exhibition game, but the Summerside League will get under way soon afterwards. It is expected that Bedeque will have a team in this league, as well as the R.C.A.F.
