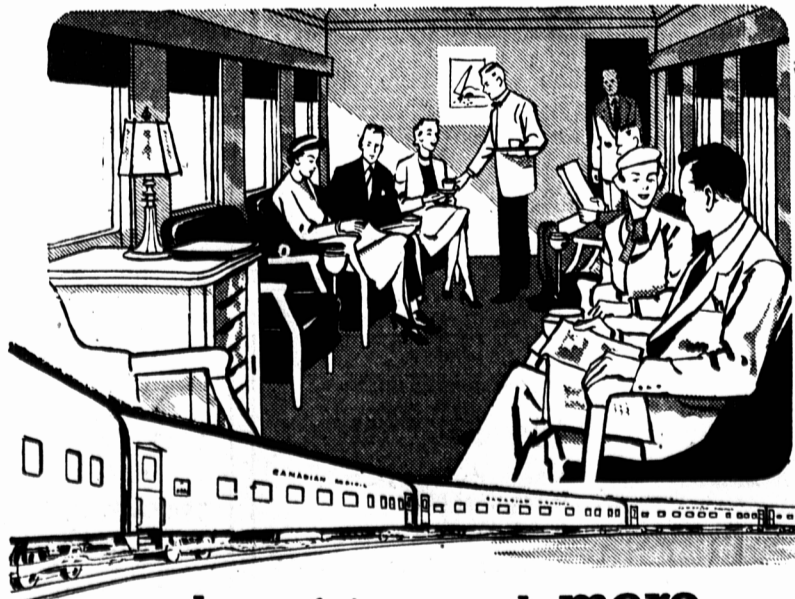

ways from shoulder at the height of the shoulder.

Aside from the patient's statements regarding pain, the diagnosis is made by a physician finding stiffness in the neck part of the spine, producing pain by forcible movements of the head downward, backward or sideways. Pain is relieved by extending the spine

straight upwards. Treatment used with success by Drs. Spurling and Segerberg is stretching of the neck by mechanical means for two hours at a time followed by one hour of rest; 8 hours sleep with no stretching (traction and this treatment carried on for 7 to 10 days. If this method fails to give relief, operation is performed in which the cushion disc is removed as is done with ruptured disc in lower back. In the 110 cases reported by Drs.

Spurling and Segerberg, 77 responded to the traction treatment. Twenty-three of the 33 patients undergoing operation were cured, and the other 10 obtained good results, that is, they were greatly improved.

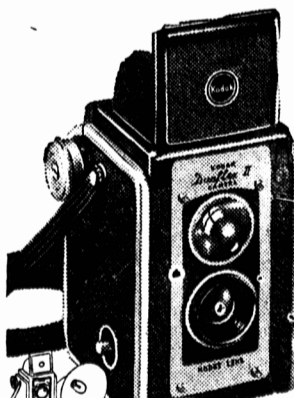
It is gratifying to know that so many of these painful neck and shoulder cases can be helped by traction or stretching, and that should this mechanical treatment fail, such complete relief in most cases and great improvement in others, can be obtained by surgery.

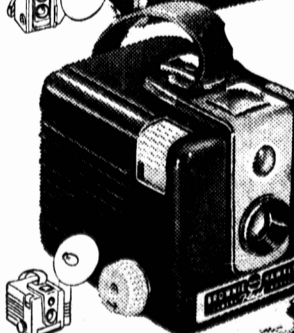

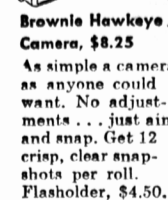

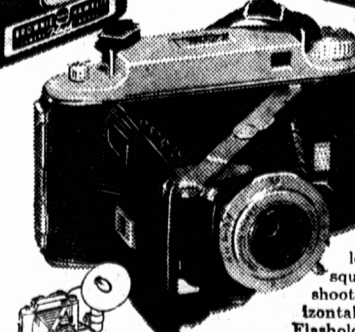
