MURDER SUSPECT MAKES ESCAPE

BOSTON (AP)—Rocco Balliro, 26, awaiting trial in the brutal slaying of a young mother and her two children, escaped from South Street Jail Sunday by jumping over a fence, police reported.

Police said Balliro dropped four feet to the ground after climbing a barbed wire fence, then disappeared.

Balliro was held in the slaying last Feb. 2 of Mrs. Toby Wagner, 21 and her son, Mark. He is charged with shooting them down in their apartment during a pillow fight with police.



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
