## DEFEAT FOR FRENCH MINISTRY And Premier Brisson has Resigned.

### RESULTS OF THE RESIGNATION OF THE MINISTER OF WAR.

Uproar in the Chamber--Cries of "Forgery" etc.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

PARIS, Oct. 26.—Amid shouts of "forgery" and a great uproar, the French ministry, led by Premier Brisson, was defeated yesterday afternoon.

The incident was the outcome of the resignation of General Chanoine, the Minister of War. A resolution calling on the Government to end the campaign of insult against the army was carried by 53 of a majority.

A vote of confidence in the Brisson Ministry was then lost on the following vote:—For 254; against 286; or a majority against the Government 32.

The Brisson Ministry has resigned.

### Club Selling.

QUEBEC, Oct. 25.—Some time ago an action was taken in the recorder's court here against the Club des Marchands for selling liquor to its members on Sunday. The proprietor of the club immediately took action in the superior court, asking for a writ for prohibition against the recorder's court, on the ground that he was allowed to sell liquor to members on Sundays. Judge Andrews rendered judgment Saturday, dismissing the petition, and declared that no club had any legal right to sell intoxicating liquors to its members on Sundays. The judgement is a most important one, as it affects bona fide clubs in the province.

### Coffee Houses.

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—Bishop Sullivan has started a movement to open coffee houses in opposition to saloons.

### Lord Seymour.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Gen. Lord Seymour and his daughters left for Halifax yesterday. The general's visit to Ottawa was shortened by unusual activity in military circles in Halifax.

## SONS OF TEMPERANCE Oldest Total Abstinence Organization in America.

### JUBILEE CELEBRATION MEETING OF P. E. ISLAND.

Interesting Historical Paper by P. G. W. P. Anderson.

The Jubilee meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, adjourned at Fredericton to meet in Charlottetown, was held in Wright's Hall yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Walter Simpson, of Bay View, resigned his position as Grand Worthy Patriarch elect, his principal reason being that a change in the office of Grand Scribe had been made after he had consented to accept it. The Rev. W. J. Kirby was thereupon elected Grand Worthy Patriarch, and the officers were installed as follows:

- G. W. P.—Rev W. J. Kirby, Charlottetown.
- G. W. A.—Miss Carrie Campbell, Graham's Road.
- G. Scribe—Ernest W Weeks, Fredericton, Post office.
- G. Treas.—D. W. Henderson, North Wiltshire.

- G. Con.—George M. Stevenson, Hazel Grove.
- G. Sentinel—W. G. Sabine, Charlottetown.
- G. S. S. W.—J. J. Chappell, Charlottetown.

In the evening a public meeting was held in Grace Church, Past Grand Worthy Patriarch Crabbie in the chair. The attendance was large. Excellent music was rendered, at intervals, by the choir and the Royal Crusaders. Hon. D. Farquharson Premier of the Province, delivered an address of welcome. This was eloquently responded to by G. W. P. Kirby.

P. L. W. P. Anderson of Kensington, then gave a historical sketch of the order in this province." He said:

When the first public effort dealing with the liquor question in our early colonial days was made the writer cannot determine. The first efforts were in the line of the enactment of license laws which were amended from time to time with further restrictions finally reaching a somewhat effective local option law as applying to the province except this city. This law being superseded in the years 1878-9 by the Canada Temperance Act.

In the early part of this century a few advanced moral reformers were daring to advocate total abstinence, notably the Rev. Mr. Paterson, Presbyterian Minister of Beauce with Rev. Mr. Snowball Methodist Minister on that circuit at that time and Mr. Gould, grandnucle of President Schurman of Cornell University, who organized in Beauce a total abstinence society about 70 years ago. They were assisted shortly afterwards by the Rev. Mr. Tupper, father of Sir Charles Tupper, who occupied the Baptist church there about the year 1830. These faithful pioneers built up a strong society which did excellent work in that most thriving community. The youngest and perhaps now the only surviving member of it is Mr. Solomon Schurman of Central Beauce who notwithstanding his advanced years still retains clear recollections of its meetings.

### AGAIN IN THE THIRTIES

A society was started in this city, known as the Charlottetown Temperance Society. But from what we can learn, it was temperance with permissions and exceptions, and perhaps dispensations. In the year '41 it adopted the principle of entire abstinence from all intoxicants, and to gain strength by larger organization it became auxiliary to an English society of that day. An effort was put forth to spread the society throughout the country districts. This effort was not as successful as its friends wished. Still, this society did excellent work in the way of public discussion on the evils of the drink traffic. In order to procure literature well suited to the needs of the people, it offered a prize for the best essay on temperance. The Rev. Dr. L. C. Jenkins, then rector of St. Paul's Church, the Rev. James Waddell, classical tutor to the Central Academy; and Daniel Hodgson, Esq., then Clerk of the Crown and Coroner of the Island, were appointed adjudicators. In due course they awarded the prize for what they deemed the best essay to the Rev. John Knox, of this city, whose life filled so large a place amongst us. That essay did an inestimable amount of good educational work; and although written 58 years ago, would be accepted today by the most advanced crank on the temperance question as strictly orthodox. I will go further and
