Dr. Malcolm B. Dockerty was a guest speaker at the 91st. annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association held in Halifax, June 16 - 20. Dr. Dockerty attended the Cardigan school and Prince of Wales College prior to entering the Dalhousie University School of Medicine.

Dr. Malcolm B. Dockerty is consultant and head of the Surgical Pathology Section at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota. He is also Professor of Pathology at the University of Minnesota Graduate School. In addition to his teaching and professional activities, Dr. Dockerty, along with his associates, has taken active participation in research development in the diagnosis of carcinoma. Dr. Dockerty is a graduate of Dalhousie University School of Medicine. Shortly after receiving his M.D. he obtained his M.S. in Pathology at the University of Minnesota. He is a member of the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists and other allied organizations.

Dr. Dockerty spoke in General Session on Thursday, June 19, and in Session B in the afternoon of the same day. His topic in the former was "Problems in Cytodetection of Early Carcinoma of the Cervix"; and in Session B he spoke on "Neoplasms of the Small Intestine."

Dr. Dockerty is expected on a brief visit to his mother, Mrs. Robert Dockerty, Charlottetown, this weekend. He will also visit Mrs. Walter Ross.
