SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Murderers of Mrs. Howe.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 28. Word from the scene of the late murder at Andover says that Phillipin's sister has made statements to the authorities which fix the guilt on Trafton and Phillipin. She says Trafton came on Sunday and induced her brother to go with him to frighten a fishing party; that Trafton fired the fatal shot, although both men did more or less shooting; that after the woman was killed, Phillipin tried to stop further shooting, but Trafton seemed maddened and kept on until stopped. The girl is supposed to have made the confession to place the guilt on Trafton and save her brother. It is believed that with the weight of evidence against them the prisoners will confess.

Fatal Shipping Disaster.

ST. FLAVIE, Que., Aug. 28. On Saturday last the S. S. Bathburg, coal laden, on her way from Sydney to Montreal, struck upon a rock at Cape Chattes and was considerably damaged. Capt. Neilson wired to Quebec for assistance. A fearful storm sprang up on Sunday night, and the captain was forced to abandon the vessel, taking off with him two lady passengers who were on board. The crew, composed of seventeen men, was left on the steamer to break up and they got off in two small boats, but shortly after they left her both boats upset and 15 sailors out of the 17 were drowned.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28. The local battery at Victoria, B. C., which was sent to the relief of the Skeena settlers, has returned.

Sir John Macdonald is expected here on Thursday, and Hon. Mr. Foster on Saturday. It is understood that their return has been somewhat hastened by the threatened complications with Yankee legislators. The Newfoundland delegates are expected here about the 19th September to confer in reference to the proposed union.

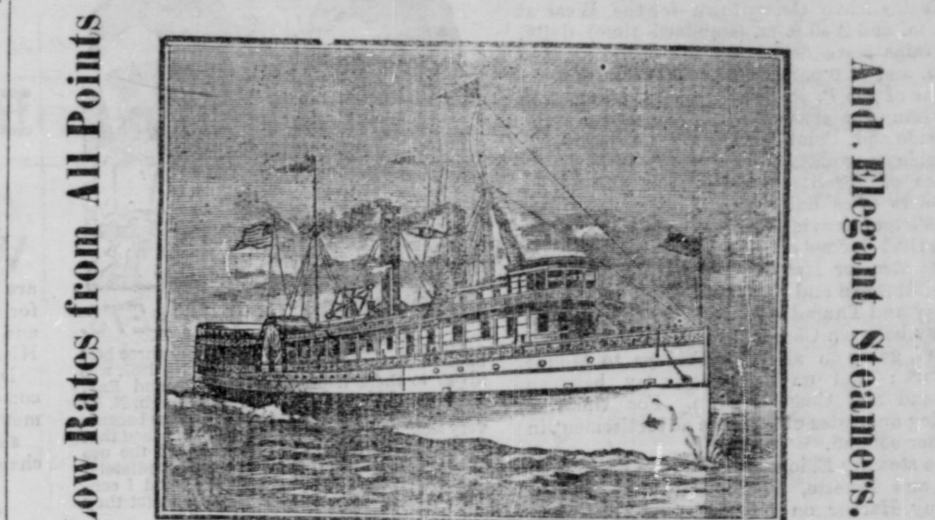
