Montague W.M.S. Hear Talk On Ukrainians Of Canada

A very enjoyable evening was spent at the home of Mrs. Victor Pepler, when the W.M.S. of Montague United Church met together for their meeting on Tuesday, March 21. The devotional service was most inspiring and was in charge of Mrs. L. A. Johnston.

The theme, "Ye are not your own" was stressed as a call to each to rededicate lives and talents anew to the Master's work. A feature of the evening was a talk by Mrs. A. D. MacKenzie on her work in Saskatchewan among the Ukrainian people. She told of their customs and described a wedding that she had attended. The groom wore a wreath of red flowers on his arm - a symbol of good living. The bride kept her foot firmly placed on a rickel. This was to ensure a prosperous life. The food was very abundant at the wedding which lasted three days. The first course was prunes which were eaten from a common dish. The chicken served was most delicious. It was first covered with a paste made of flour, water and salt, then the coals were raked out from the great oven and the chicken was covered up in the ashes, so it retained all its savory juices. Another dish, called Halupeti, was cabbage, rice, and bacon. The rice was rolled tightly in cabbage leaves. These little tight rolls were closely packed together in a dish. Strips of bacon were spread over the top and this was cooked over hot water.

Mrs. MacKenzie told of the kindness of these new Canadians and how she enjoyed her life as a teacher among them. Also how they tried to adapt themselves to their new mode of life, how hard they worked and how clean and homey they made their homes. And how gracious the hospitality is in even the humblest home. They are very musical and sing and dance. One of their dances is the Kalomaka. She told of inviting them to a Halloween party and how they all entered into the spirit of the evening. One thing was rather sad - in their lives, though. The children do not know how to play. When they get home from school, they work.

During the month 37 hospital and 33 sick calls were made, 13 cards and 43 treats were sent to sick and sorrowing friends. After the meeting closed, refreshments were served and a pleasant half hour was enjoyed.

JACOBY ON Canasta

For Beginners - 10

We have been watching a hand of Canasta, and we not watch the dealer, South, make his first play. He holds the following cards:

K-Q-J-9-8 6-5-4 4-4-4 The previous discard has a black three, so South automatically draws from the stock pile. He cannot pick up that black three.

This is a general rule of Canasta. If the previous discard is a black three, you cannot pick it up. In a manner of speaking, the black three is a "stop" card. It affects only the very next player, and later discards are treated in the normal way.

There are four black threes in the deck, but they cannot be melded during the regular play of the hand. A player is allowed to meld black threes only when he is melding out on that very play. At that time, and only at that time he may meld four black threes, or three black threes, or even two black threes and a wild card.

In this particular hand, South draws from the stock and gets a red three. We have already seen that red threes are very special cards. South puts it down on the table at once, together with the red three that his partner put down earlier in the hand. South draws another card from the stock to replace the red three. This is all regular procedure. You always put down a red three as soon as you get one, and you draw from the stock to replace a red three that you have drawn from the stock.

South draws a ten, and now has to make a discard since there is no sufficient meld in the hand. He decides to discard his queen, thus ending his play.

Save these simple installments. If you're a beginner, you'll soon be able to profit from the tips given in the second part of each article. If you're an experienced player, save the first half to teach the game to others.

For Experienced Players - 10

In the first part of this article we note that South discards the queen from his rather miserable hand. His reason for choosing this discard is that West, the player at his left, discarded a queen on the previous turn.

This brings us to a rather elementary but all-important principle of Canasta: It is vital to watch the discards of the player at your left.

Actually, it is important to watch all the discards; but it is especially important to watch those made by your left-hand opponent. That player will usually discard the cards that don't match up with the rest of his hand - just as everybody usually does.

For example, in the game that we have been watching West made the first play of the hand and discarded a queen.
