When our arms ached like fury and our stomachs felt bottomless, granddad would put away his implement of torture and proudly announce, "I reckon ye boys have earned your supper. Let's go and

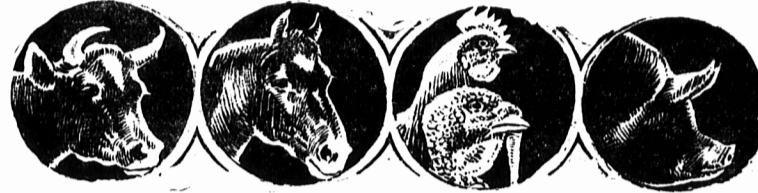

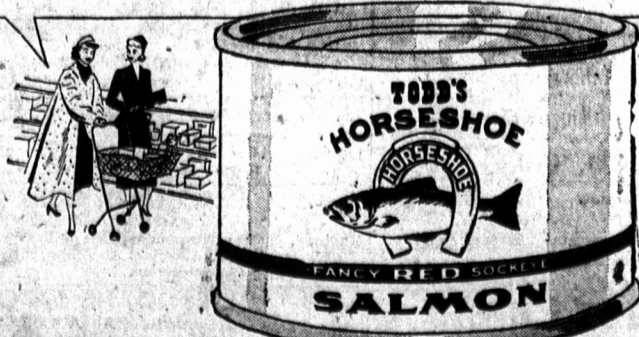
